## Test Case Set To Determine Grocer Rights

A test of the 1935 Oregon fair trade act is involved in a suit brought by the Berden company against Ed Schreder, Salem grocer.  
The plaintiff complains that Schreder has advertised and sold one of its trade-marked items, "Hemo," at a price lower than its established retail price.

The complaint sets up that Berden's have entered into numerous contracts with Oregon dealers fixing resale prices but does not assert any contract with Schreder. It seeks to have Schreder enjoined from selling its product below the price fixed in contracts with others in Oregon.  
The case will test whether a manufacturer can restrain a dealer not under contract with the manufacturer from selling its product at less than the price the maker fixes. The case is expected to attract close interest among manufacturers of trade-marked merchandise and retailers.
