

Nazis on Trial Hear Tales of Horror Camps

NUERNBERG, Dec. 12.—(AP)—Six leading Nazis were accused today by their own documents of engineering the brutal, sub-human enslavement of more than 6,500,000 foreign workers through ruthless manhunt, arson and murder.

Fritz Sauckel, responsible only to Hitler as reich plenipotentiary for labor allocation, was portrayed as the chief architect of the labor enslavement program which so disgusted even Nazi underlings that they dared complain of inhuman treatment.

The documents told of prisoners dying like flies from hunger; of whole villages burned to force laborers into the reich; of humans being hunted down in wild man-hunts by the SS; of babies being born on slave trains being thrown out of train windows.

Presiding Lord Justice Geoffrey Lawrence called special attention of the court to a line in an order to SS kidnapers from the security police in March, 1943, concerning the recruitment of workers from Poland and Russia.

"As a rule, no more children will be shot," the order said. Drawn into the net of evidence were Reichsmarshal Hermann Goering, Munitions Minister Albert Speer, Nazi philosopher Alfred Rosenberg, Field Marshal Wilhelm Keitel, and Hans Frank, governor general for Poland.

Lone Oregon Employee Tops \$75,000 Salary

The Oregonian was R. R. Adams, general manager of Meier & Frank Co., Portland. His compensation during the year ending January 31, 1944, was \$85,000—a \$50,000 salary and \$25,000 bonus.

Tre-lawney, its youth chairman, in their letter urged, however, "that steps should be taken as quickly as possible to provide a segregation building for which plans have been prepared. WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—(AP)—Experienced flight test crews have been ordered to inspect approximately 20,500 army planes in the U. S. rose from 39 per 100,000 flying hours in the last quarter of 1944 to 47 per 100,000 hours in August, September and October of this year.

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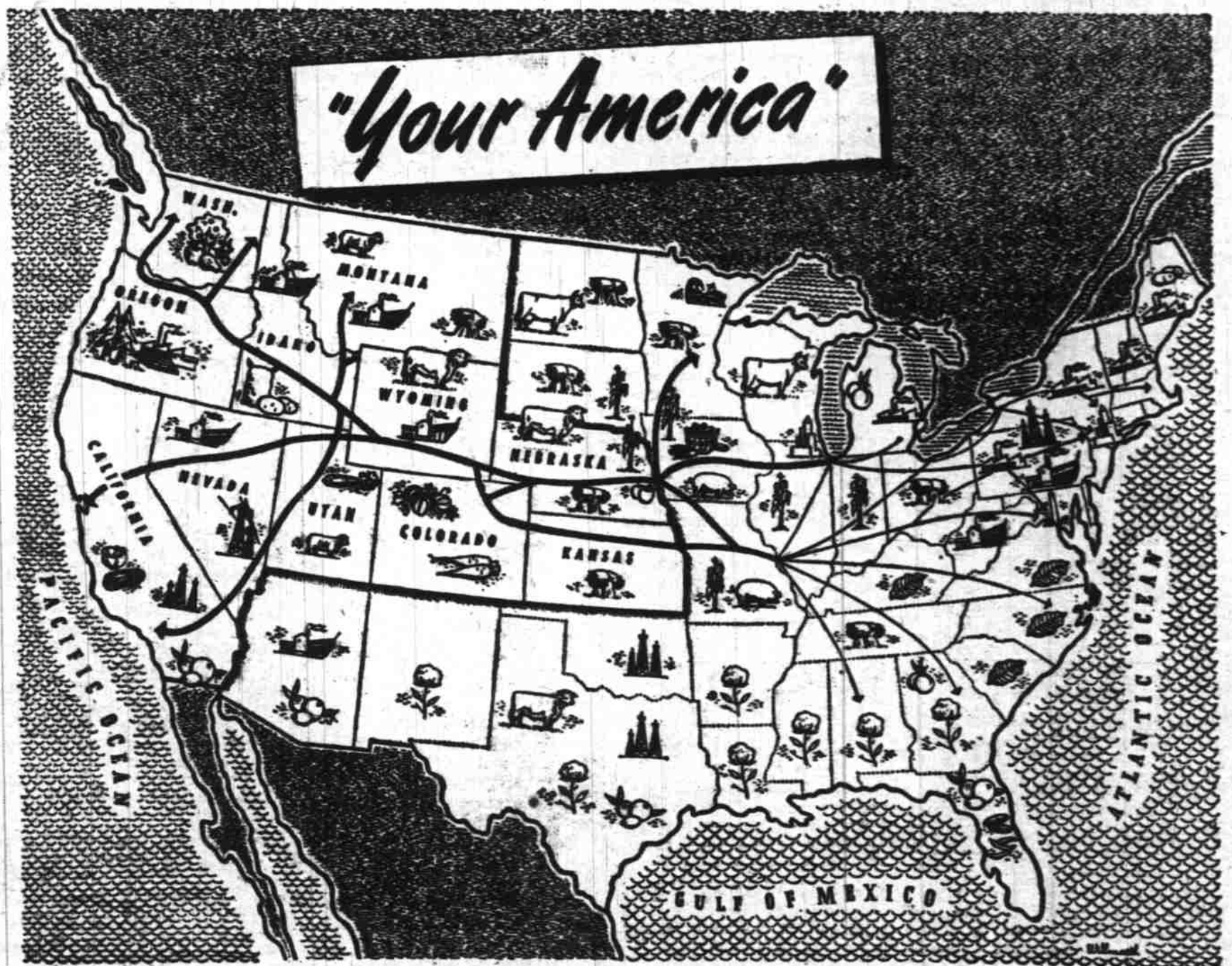
