Ship Repairs Delay Pastor's China Journey

The Rev. John J. Trachsel, pastor of the South Salem Friends church, has been notified of the postponement in the sailing date of the ship that would carry him to the mission fields of China. Because of a delay in repairs now being made on the Marine Raven, an American Mail line boat, Trachsel will not leave Seattle until after January 1.

This will be Trachsel's third trip to the orient, having served two terms on the mission fields of China since 1930. At the outbreak of the war he was imprisoned by the Japanese and later repatriated with other nationals on the second trip of the Gripsholm. Trachsel expects to go direct to Tientsin, China, and from there will be assigned to a field.

Mrs. Trachsel and their three daughters will remain in Salem until conditions in China make it possible for them to join Trachsel. They reside at 1810 S. High st.
