Prosecution Winds Up Case Against Nips

YOKOHAMA, Friday, Dec. 21 (AP)—The prosecution completed its presentation of war crimes testimony against Tatsu Tsuchiya, former guard at a Japanese prison camp, today and the defense immediately demanded acquittal on grounds the defendant had not been identified as accused.

The military commission trying Tsuchiya on charges of having murdered American PFC. Robert Gordon Teas was to hear arguments on the motion this afternoon.

Confusion charged Lt. Col. John Dickinson, chief of defense counsel, charged that prosecution affidavits from liberated prisoners of Mitsuishima camp were confusing and conflicting and that the prosecution had not proved its case beyond reasonable doubt. He said two guards at the camp were dubbed "glass eye" by yanks in their custody and that Tsuchiya had not been identified positively as the "Little Glass Eye" accused of Teas' brutal murder.

Surprise Move Just before it rested, the prosecution, in a surprise move, won

admission of an affidavit by PFC. Charles B. Gavord, Deming, N. M., it previously was rejected as evidence when the defense argued that it was a mimeographed rather than a true copy. Lt. David I. Day, Jr., assistant prosecutor, called as a surprise witness, testified he was on Luzon when prisoner of war affidavits were taken. Although he couldn't recall taking Gavord's statement, Day said, and wouldn't recognize Gavord if he saw him, he recalled strange nicknames such as "Little Glass Eye" and "Mickey Mouse" by which liberators referred to Japanese accused of brutalities.

The prosecution used three and a half days in presenting testimony.
