- VEGETABLE RICE**
- 1/2 cup uncooked rice
 - 2 quarts boiling water
 - 1 cup diced onions
 - 1 cup diced celery
 - 1 pint cooked peas
 - 1 pint carrots
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 2 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce

Cook rice until tender in the boiling water to which 2 teaspoons salt have been added. Drain the rice but keep it warm. Cook the onion and celery in a little water and when almost tender, add the peas and carrots. Boil 10 to 15 minutes. Add the salt and Worcestershire sauce. Stir thoroughly. Remove rice to warm platter and pour sauce over it.

- 3 1/2 cups CROWN BEST PATENT FLOUR
- 1 cake Fleischmann's Yeast
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 tablespoons shortening
- 1 cup warm water
- 1 egg

Sift together the flour, sugar and salt. Dissolve yeast cake in warm water and add to above, then mix. Add egg and shortening and mix. Place on floured board and knead until dough is smooth.

Allow to rise until double the original size, approximately 1 1/2 hours, depending on the temperature. Roll the dough to 1/2 inch in thickness on floured board. Cut with biscuit cutter. Make a deep crease across the center of the biscuit, using a knife handle, then brush with melted butter across the top. Allow to rise about 1/2 hour in a warm place on greased pan. Bake at 450°.
