Erickson, who paid high tribute to his predecessor, Roy S. He entered the army in November, 1944, and in April, 1945, he went to the Philippines, where he was attached to the 24th signal company. Just before Christmas he was transferred to Japan, where he found people and the weather (cold and snowy) different from the islands.

An older brother, PFC Emery Hendrickson, is now at home, having been discharged in December after almost two years in the European theatre. He wears the Victory medal, Good Conduct ribbon and the ETO ribbon with five battle stars.

### Noxious Weed Action Sought

A proposed uniform noxious weed seed list of both primary and secondary noxious weeds will be submitted for ratification to all western states as the result of action taken at a recent meeting of western states seed law enforcement officials at Reno, Nev. Frank McKennon, chief of the Oregon state agricultural department plant division, attended the sessions.

Oregon, along with several other states, will require legislation for uniform list approval. Primary noxious weeds would be those entirely prohibited while secondary weeds would be those that must be shown on seed labels, provided they are within stipulated tolerances.
