Purchased by Hazen, Rand

Henry M. Hazen of Salem and Dewey-Rand of Portland Thursday purchased the Capital Press, local weekly which has been published for 18 years by A. H. Church.

Church disposes of his entire interest in the plant but the interest of his son, Dana Church, will be retained by contract for at least three years.

Litigation started by Rand against Church soon after negotiations for the sale started in 1945, is being withdrawn in the Marion county circuit court.

Hazen came to Salem from Idaho 30 years ago and later was employed on Salem newspapers and the old Portland Telegram.

He served as state budget director during the administration of Julius L. Meier as governor.

Rand has been active in politics in Portland and published weekly newspapers there.
