The ticket reads practically the same for Friday, with the championship flight semifinals due Friday night. Battles for third, fourth and fifth places are called for Saturday morning and night, the championship game coming at 8:45 o'clock.

Baker's Bulldogs against Oregon City's Pioneers at 4:25. Wednesday's night round pits Washington's defending champions of Portland against The Dalles Indians at 7:30 and Astoria's Purple Fishermen against Lebanon's Warriors at 8:45.

Basketball-buzzing railbirds, now ragging with the annual hoop fever, and who get the quote marks around it when they're dubbed experts, aren't too reluctant to point to the tough Portland entries as the top teams to beat. Washington's champion Colonials, winners of the Portland derby in a breeze, are liked for a repeat by many, the multitude. Roosevelt's Teddies, second best to the Colonials in the metropolitan league and a "hot" ball club the past few weeks, bring along a hefty share of titular support also.

Coach Harold Hauk's Vikings, at times a smacking good ball club this winter, and at others a so-so aggregation, could be right tough. In Hauk the Vikings have one of the top tourney-wisened gents in the state, and if the Salems are in the mood they'll be heard from right down to the wire. The in-and-outness of the Vikings during the winter doesn't make for favoritism in the classic, however. Same goes for Astoria's Fishermen. Their coach, Wally Palmberg is another laden with tournament wisdom, and local na-

tives have learned never to sell the Palmbergs short when they come to the village in March. Palmberg has the enviable habit of being a pretty smart basketball cookie.

Bud Page's Lebanon, Oral Robinson's McMinnville, Hank Anderson's Bakers, Hank Kuchera's Eugene's and Dan Jones' Oregon Cityans aren't to be taken lightly, for all come with sharp outfits classed as capable of kayoing any prep quint in the state when "on." The Medford, Bend, Rainier, Hillsboro, Marshfield and The Dalles entries don't rate quite as highly with these same "experts" and their prognosticating. The wise boys aren't hesitant in pointing out, however, that the team with the most wind storage will wind up in the driver's seat Saturday night, for the eventual champion faces the rugged four-games-in-four-or-five days grind.
