

Grain Prices Remain Steady, Trade Drags

CHICAGO, March 12—(AP)—Grain future traders could find no reason for aggressive support in any of the active contracts today, with the result that no important price changes developed.

The general attitude of the pit traders was to mark time, pending announcement at Washington of the new feed-grain control order, expected some time this week.

May rye registered a gain of more than 1 cent, due largely to the decrease of supplies at important terminals and the strength displayed at Winnipeg.

Outside interest was only fair in any of the pits. Commercial interests were on both sides of the oats market with offerings increasing on the hard spots.

The effect of continued strong demand for cash grain was offset by favorable weather and crop reports. The department of agriculture placed the winter wheat crop as of March 1 at 751,000,000 bushels, slightly under record production.

At the finish wheat was unchanged to 1/4 higher than yesterday's close, May \$1.83 1/2. Corn was unchanged at ceiling, \$1.21 1/2. Oats were 1/4 lower to 1/4 higher, May \$2.74. Rye was unchanged to 1/4 higher, May \$2.12 1/2. Barley was unchanged, May \$1.26 1/2.

Varied Stocks Sustain Rise On Wall Street

NEW YORK, March 12—(AP)—Scattered stocks made some headway in today's market although many leaders continued to drift lower in the slowest dealings for about seven months.

Steels came up at the finish, along with other favorites, when ceilings were lifted on castings and railroad specialties. Motors responded somewhat mildly to action of the OPA in paving the way for increased prices of new cars. Amusements still reflected the earnings outlook in this field. A few aircraft were buoyed by prospects for maintaining a strong military establishment.

Transfers of 720,000 shares were a low total for a full session since last August 8. They compared with 880,000 Monday.

Paramount Pictures added 3 1/2, and Atlantic Coast Line, Eastman Kodak, Douglas Aircraft and Union Carbide were up about 2 each. Lesser gainers included Twentieth Century-Fox, Pepsi-Cola, U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Republic Steel, Youngstown Sheet, Chrysler, Hudson Motors, Graham-Paige, Goodrich, Glenn Martin, Boeing, Lockheed, American Telephone, Electric Power & Light, Kennecott, Du Pont, Santa Fe, N. Y. Central, Northern Pacific and Chesapeake & Ohio.
