School Building Plans Delayed Over Oregon

High construction costs and materials shortage are delaying post-war construction projects in most of the state's school district, according to D. A. Emerson of the state educational department, who recently returned from a tour of the state during which he contacted many school district boards.

He said the school district construction program involved a total expenditure estimated in excess of \$40,000,000.

Figures tabulated by Emerson show that bond issues and sinking funds earmarked for school construction now total more than \$20,000,000 of which approximately \$5,000,000 will be expended in the city of Portland.

Emerson also reported a serious housing situation involving school operating personnel. In some school districts, he said, the housing shortage had made it necessary for the school boards to provide living accommodations for teachers in their school plants.
