Navajo Missionary Will Speak Here Tonight

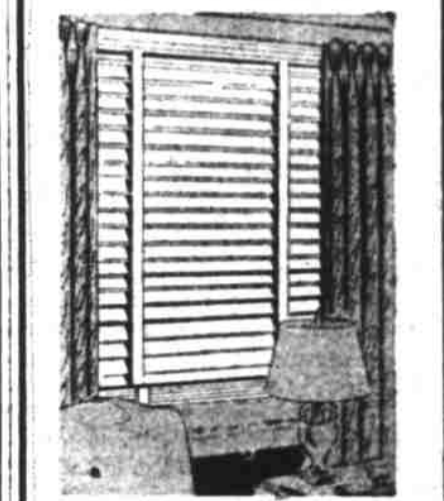
