Presented by Panhellenic semi-annually to the highest ranking living organization on the campus, a temporary plaque is taking the place of the cup until materials are available for a new one to be made.

Also presented yesterday was the silver scholarship cup awarded by the interfraternity council to Alpha Psi Delta fraternity for the highest grade point average, 2.6, among the fraternities on the campus.

Izaak Walton Leader Asks Wild Life Aid

Conservation of the wild life pays dividends, Merle Brown, president of the Portland chapter of the Izaak Walton league, told members of the Salem Chamber of Commerce Monday.

The dividends are counted in the health of the state's citizens, and in the recreation facilities which the woods and wild life provide especially for its young people, Brown stressed.

The story of the number of pheasants taken by home and out of state hunters in South Dakota last year was told by Brown, a former member of the Sioux Falls, South Dakota chapter. Restoration and increase of the game was the result of activity of the Izaak Walton league when birds were at a low ebb, Brown said.

Control of water pollution in Oregon streams is one of the state club's projects. Others listed by Brown are opposition to dam construction on the Rogue and Umpqua rivers, sponsorship of a law to make spotlighting of deer a felony, and opposition to any dam construction across a stream before a full investigation.

Youth Congress Draws Willamette Representatives

Dr. R. Ivan Lovell, head of the history department of Willamette university, Jan Patterson, Salem, and Harold Malde, Portland, will represent Willamette at the Northwest Youth Congress, which meets on the Reed college campus in Portland next weekend.
