

CE Convention To Conclude Sunday Night

Family Communion Sunday is Started By St. Mary's Parish

MT. ANGEL, April 5 (Special) - In this day of specializing and segregating it was edifying to see the parishioners of St. Mary's Catholic church gathered in family groups at the different masses last Sunday morning to observe Family Communion Sunday, the first time ever observed in Mt. Angel. The idea was originated by Father Damien Jentges, pastor of St. Mary's since last summer and a strong advocate of family life.

Seeing that the modern tendency in religious as well as secular matters was to single out the individual for instruction, training or entertainment and also to help all the more to break down the bond which holds the family together, Father Damien introduced the family communion Sunday which will henceforth be observed here on every fifth Sunday of the month, or four times a year.

On these Sundays parents and their children go together to the same mass and sit together in contrast to other Sundays when the children are gathered in one group in the front pews and the parents scattered through the rest of the church. Perhaps one, perhaps the other receives the communion while under the new arrangement, the entire family approaches, the communion rail in a group, united by a sacred bond that cannot but help to stabilize emotionally and strengthen spiritually each family.
