

# Music For Today

It's an imposing array of good music offered on the air during the weekend. Artur Rodzinski conducts the New York Philharmonic-Symphony, on CBS; Toscanini will direct the NBC orchestra; Jose Iturbi will appear as both conductor and piano soloist with the Ford orchestra.

Serious musical programs for today include:

9:30 CBS, Paul LaValle will direct the Stradivari orchestra in "Clavelles" by Valverde, "Thousand and One Nights" by Strauss and "Liebestraum" by Liszt; Jacques Gassel, violinist and Nino Ventura, tenor, will be soloists.

The New York Philharmonic Symphony's noontime concert on CBS under Rodzinski will include the Chausson symphony in B flat major, overture to "Der Freischutz" by Weber, "Spirituale" for string choir and orchestra by Gould and "Polovetzian Dances" from "Prince Igor" by Borodin.

At 2 o'clock, Toscanini will direct the NBC orchestra in overture from "Cosas Breugnon" by Kabalevsky, "Festin de l'Arriagne" by Roussel, "Sarabande" by Roger-Ducasse and overture from Tchaikovsky's "Romeo and Juliet."

The Ford orchestra on ABC at 5 o'clock under Iturbi, who is piano soloist, will play the finale from Grieg's A minor concerto. The orchestral program also includes overture to "L'Italianain Algeri" by Rossini, intermezzo from "Cavalleria Rusticana" by Mascagni, "Farruca" and finale from "Three Cornered Hat" by de Falla, "Murmuring Zephyrs" by Jensen and "Bolero" by Ravel. Iturbi will also play scherzo in B flat minor by Chopin.

Helen Traubel will be guest artist on the Monday night Telephone hour at 9 o'clock on NBC. She'll sing "Wares so Schmalich"

from "Die Walkure," "Steal Away" a spiritual, and "Love Went A-Riding" by Bridge. The orchestra under Donald Voorhees will play the overture from Rimsky-Korsakov's "Pskovitianka" and others.

Eleanor Steber is to be guest soloist with the Firestone orchestra at 8:30 Monday night on NBC. She'll sing "I'll See You Again" by Coward, "Ah, Fors E Lui" from "Traviata" by Verdi, "Just a Wearying for You" by Bond and "The Song Is You" by Kern.

Several record albums well worth noting have come out within the past few weeks. First one of interest, and one particularly suited to the Lenten season is the album of six sacred songs sung by Dorothy Maynor, soprano, with the Victor salon orchestra, directed by Sylvan Levin. Represented are Mozart, Bach, Handel and included are songs from "Elijah," "The Messiah," "St. Matthew Passion" and others.

The famous-negro soprano is at her best singing sacred music and Victor did itself proud in the mechanics of the recording.

Another new album, and one which provides some of the sweetest music of the late 19th century, is that of the compositions of Ethelbert Nevin, played by the Victor orchestra. Included are such as "Narcissus," "A Shepherd's Tale," "My Desire," "Mighty Lak' a Rose," "Twas a Lover and His Lass," "The Night Has a Thousand Eyes," "Little Boy Blue" and others.

## Mrs. Eric Johnston Tells AAUW Of Women's Job Handicaps

FOREST GROVE, April 6.—(Special)—A woman must be three times as good as the best man available when she is put in a job which may be held by either. This was the statement of Mrs. Eric Johnston of Spokane, north Pacific regional vice president of the AAUW at the Oregon state convention here today.

Mrs. Johnston was the luncheon speaker and in outlining the national organization aims seconded the statements of Dorothy McCullough Lee, Portland city, commissioner and state legislative chairman, who urged that members of the organization take more active part in civic affairs.

Mrs. Johnston quoted a Texas woman judge on the ability which a woman should have to hold office saying "A man who is judge can play pinochle in chambers, but if I did I'd no longer be judge and the man would have the job."

### 20' Salem Women

Headed by Mrs. John Baircham, state vice president and Salem branch president, more than 20 Salem women went to the convention Saturday. Portland had the largest delegation and all but one of the state's 27 branches were represented. Grants Pass was announced as the newest branch in Oregon. Mrs. C. D. Winston of

Corvallis, state president, presided.

A correlated community social studies program was presented for consideration of branch members by Edith Hystop, national associate in social studies, who is touring the west coast states with Mrs. Johnston. The program seemed to meet with approval of the delegates present and indications were given that the plan will be tried in many branches.

A roster of qualified women for various posts for which appointments are made by various state commissions is being compiled by the state AAUW and a progress report was made to Carolyn Wilson of Salem, chairman of the committee. Blanks for reports of women and their qualifications for the various posts were distributed.
