Contract Ready For Umpqua River Project

Contract involving the proposed California-Oregon Power company's development program in the vicinity of Tokatee Falls on the North Umpqua river in Douglas county, has been prepared by the state hydroelectric commission, subject to approval of the power company officials.

Cost of the development was estimated at \$4,000,000 with construction to start as soon as materials and manpower are available. The development contemplates a reservoir, diversion dam, tunnel and power plant with transmission lines extending to the company's station near Roseburg. The dam will be located approximately one mile above the falls. C. E. Strickland, secretary of the commission, said this was probably the outstanding power company development now under consideration in Oregon.

Lt. Cmdr. Purvine Discharged in Seattle

Lt. Cmdr. Ralph E. Purvine was released from the United States naval medical reserve this week at Seattle, after three and a half years of service. For over three years he was stationed at the selective service headquarters. For the last two months he has been stationed at the Corvallis naval hospital.
