Capt. Maxwell Back in Home Town for Visit

Capt. Chrystalee Maxwell, formerly of Salem and one of the first contingent of 30 Negro nurses sent overseas in World War II, visited in this city recently with Mrs. A. A. Lee and other friends. Captain Maxwell has been in the army medical corps for 44 months and was in Liberia for a year. Accompanying her was an adopted orphan, Brenda, who she brought from Liberia.

The captain, a native of Salem and the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. M. Maxwell who moved to Los Angeles several years ago, recently has been chief nurse at Camp San Luis Obispo.

Formerly she was night supervisor of a 3000-bed hospital at Camp Livingston, La.; principal chief nurse at Camp Callan, Calif., in charge of a 1200-bed hospital, and chief nurse at the Papago Park, Ariz., German prison camp. Her positions have varied under circumstances in which medical and nursing staffs were chosen without regard to race.

Captain Maxwell is on terminal leave in Portland and expects soon to return to her pre-war post at Los Angeles county hospital.

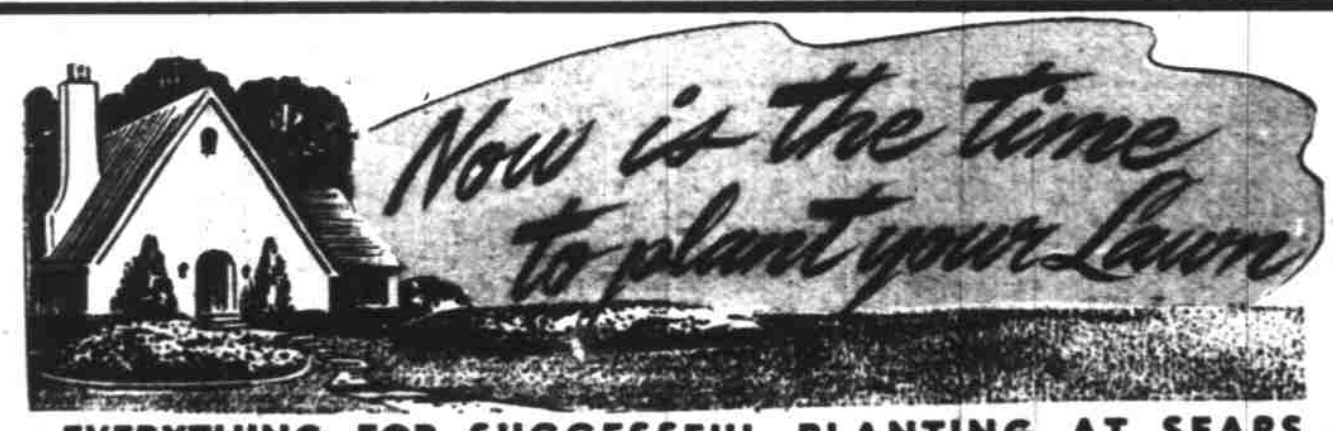
