

# Music for Today

Of course it's Easter music for today. Gounod, Adams, Handel, Rimsky-Korsakov and others will be represented. Several outstanding artists and conductors are listed to perform today.

The Stradivari orchestra, playing over ABC at 9:30 this morning will include the works of Tchaikowski, Bizet, Mascagni, Greig and Schubert.

At 11 on the "Harvest of Stars" program will be heard the Lyn Murray chorus singing "Unfold Ye Portals" by Gounod, "Rimsky-Korsakov: a spiritual, 'Were You There,' 'The Crucifix' by Faure and 'The Hold City' will be sung by Jan Peerce, tenor.

At 2 o'clock, General Motors symphony orchestra, under the direction of Franco Auteri, will play Boyce's first symphony, "Gymnopédie" No. 1 by Satie, "Don Juan" by Strauss, "Gold and Silver Waltz" by Lehar and again, the "Russian Easter Overture."

Eugene Goossens will conduct the Ford orchestra and chorus, assisted by Eleanor Steber, soprano, Charles Kullman, tenor, in a concert including opening chorus from Smetana's "Battered Bride," "Solemn Melody" by Davies, "Onaway, Awake Beloved" from "Hiawatha's Wedding Feast" by Coleridge-Taylor, waltz song from "Romeo and Juliet" by Gounod, chorus of Gibelungens, from "Goetterdaemmerung" by Wagner, the finale from act I of "Madame Butterfly" by Puccini, "The Bell," by Byrd, Creston's "23d Psalm," "The Holy City" by Adams, prelude and march from "Le Coq d'Or," Rimsky Korsakov, and the "Hallelujah Chorus" from "The Messiah" by Handel.

The "American Album of Familiar Music" on NBC at 6:30 will include an all-Easter program sung by Donald Dame, Margaret Damm, Jean Dickenson and Evelyn McGreggor. The Buckingham choir will assist and Gustave Haenschen's orchestra will play.

Monday's programs of special merit include the Firestone hour at 5:30 on NBC, when Stella Roman, soprano and Igor Gorin will sing and the orchestra will be directed by Howard Barlow. Miss Roman will sing "Vissi d'Arte" from "Tosca" by Puccini; Gorin will sing "Water Boy" by Robinson; together they will sing "You Are Free" by Jacobi and "Wanting You."

At 9 o'clock, Robert Cassadesus will be piano soloist with the Bell symphony orchestra under Donald Voorhees playing "Cordoba" by Albeniz, selections from "Concerto in E flat major" by Liszt.
