By Bob Thomas HOLLYWOOD, April 20—(AP)—Most Hollywood comedians, caught with their writers in Palm Springs over the weekend, were at a loss today to define a joke. Even a \$50,000 bequest by G. C. Richardson of Huron, S.D., to the person best defining the word failed to inspire them. Perhaps the most apt definition of the word by a Hollywood comic would be: "That for which I pay \$5000 a week to five men with index files." Or, as Bill Bendix puts it: "A joke is anything said by a guy who has a lot of writers."

Needs a Script

For in this town, a comedian without a writer is like McCarthy without Bergen. He is hilarious with a script in front of him, but rather dull in the parlor. As Fred Allen once said of Jack Benny: "He couldn't ad lib a belch after a Hungarian dinner." But coached or not, here is how some Hollywood funny men define a joke: Fibber McGee: "A device designed to take the stuffing out of shirts."
