

Women to Hear About MacDowell

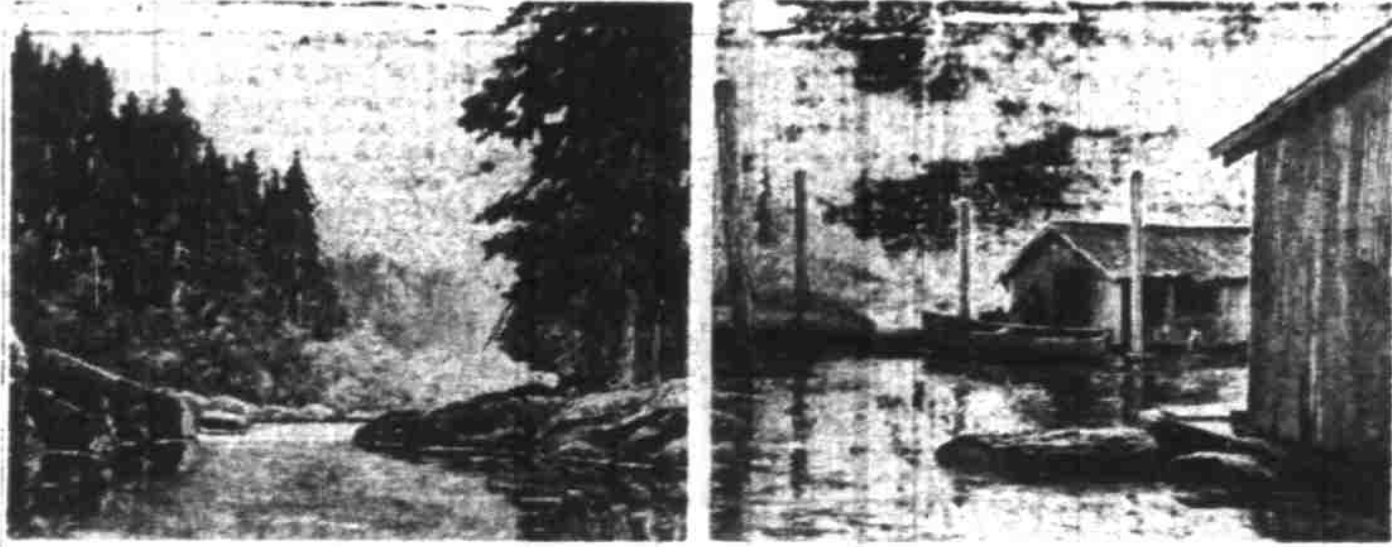
The Saturday meeting of the Salem Woman's club is to be dedicated to National music week and Mrs. David Cameron, music chairman will be in charge of the program.

Art Exhibit Remains at New Gallery

Now that all the tramping's over and the public has settled down to routine window shopping, those persons who have wanted to relax and look at the display of paintings at Elfstrom's art gallery may do so in comparative seclusion. While the art galleries, first to be set up in a Salem store, entertain a good many lookers during an eight-hour day, the galleries are uncrowded at any one time.

Most of the gallery's first exhibit is from the works of northwest professionals, with two or three guest exhibitors.

Peter Sheffers of Portland displays two oils, "Mt. Jefferson at Dawn" and "Where the Cliffs Meet the Sea at DePoe Bay." Arthur Selander's are "Rainbow's Habitat" and "Granite of the High Sierras."

E. B. Quigley of Portland displays three popular westerns, "Making Up the Head," "Alert" and "Dusty Trail." Ray Strong of Berkeley has "California Hills," "Cool Cascades" and "Upland Pasture."

"Summer Landscape" is by David McCosh and there's a still life by Andrew Vincent, both from U of O. The portrait, "Green and Yellow," is by Ann Kulka of Eugene.

Menalkus Selander, formerly of Salem but now of Oswego, sends "Drifting Fog near Bandon" and "Winding Water." "Early Snow," "Surf at Yachats" and "Sunlit Breaker" are painted by Albert Petevky of Portland, and "An Oregon Symphony" by Clyde Leon Keller.

A painting, "Sierra Poppies," is by Maude W. Wanker of Wecoma, and "Near Westfir" South Willamette street "Eugene," by Curus Fulton of Eugene. Loren Boullier, director of the galleries, is exhibiting "Sillcoos Lake" and "Waters of Lagunitus."

The nude, "The Letter," by Emil Kosa of Los Angeles is causing a good deal of interest at the gallery.

Percy Manser of Hood River has two oils, "The Wagon Train" and "Ranch in the Klamathas."

The exhibit will remain through May 18.
