### Federation Convention Scheduled

Club women from over the state will attend the 36th biennial convention of the Oregon Federation of Women's Clubs convention, Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. Sessions are mostly scheduled for the First Christian church.

W. E. Kimsey, labor commissioner for Oregon will be speaker at the Monday morning session. Elmer F. Nelson of the San Francisco office of the OPA will be the afternoon speaker. The junior clubs will be in charge of the evening session. Other speakers are to be Mayor Earl Riley and Dean Buena Maria.

Tuesday's schedule includes the president's breakfast at 8 a. m. at the Heathman hotel; business meeting; talk by Miss Dorothea Moore of the state department of education and junior luncheon. A tea honoring past presidents of the federation at the art museum is also scheduled for Tuesday. Chancellor Frederick M. Hunter will speak briefly at the evening session and the address will be given by Dr. Harry Newburn, president of the University of Oregon.
