The story is of the adventures of a princess of Russia held for ransom by the Cossacks and of her life and romance in the forest.

Lila Partmentier is Tatiana, the princess of Russia; Bob Bain as Vaslov, chief of the Cossacks; Ray Cummings as Ivan; Barbara Senter as Sonia; Barbara Taylor as Mother Vanya, and Alan Gilchrist as Ilyich, are Cossacks.

Phil Ringle plays Tzar Mikhail, Jim Hunt is Prince Dmitri and Ralph Blakeley is the jester, members of the Russian court. Scenes take place at the Tsar's palace in Moscow and in the forest. Colorful costumes of the Cossacks and the court make the play unusually good for production. Some 200 pupils will take part.
