## Coal Crisis Hits Market

NEW YORK, May 8—(AP)—Renewed pessimism in the coal crisis gripped the stock market today. A number of pivotal issues gave up fractions to more than a point, although special news of dividends, stock splits and earnings propped some favorites, especially among industrials.

Transfers totaled 1,210,000 shares against 1,350,000 Tuesday. The Associated Press 60-stock average dipped .1 of a point to 78.6.

After directors approved a stock split and increased dividend rate, Distillers Corp. added 6 points to recent gains, then lost it and closed off 1/4 at \$112.
