### Rosson Tells Of Activities Of VA Offices

A total of 30,429 personal interviews with Oregon veterans and their dependents have been held in the Portland and Salem offices of the state department of veterans' affairs, according to a bulletin released Friday by Director Hugh E. Rosson.

The bulletin covers the activities of the department from July 1, 1945, to May 1, 1946, the ten months it has been in operation.

Dealing mainly with department policies the bulletin also reports that 409 educational aid grants have been made to Oregon veterans and 446 loan applications for purchase of farms and homes have received action, with 187 of these approved and 116 pending.

Rosson's report explains that the 1945 legislature which created the department also authorized county courts to appoint paid service officers. Department representatives have called upon the county courts to encourage such appointments.
