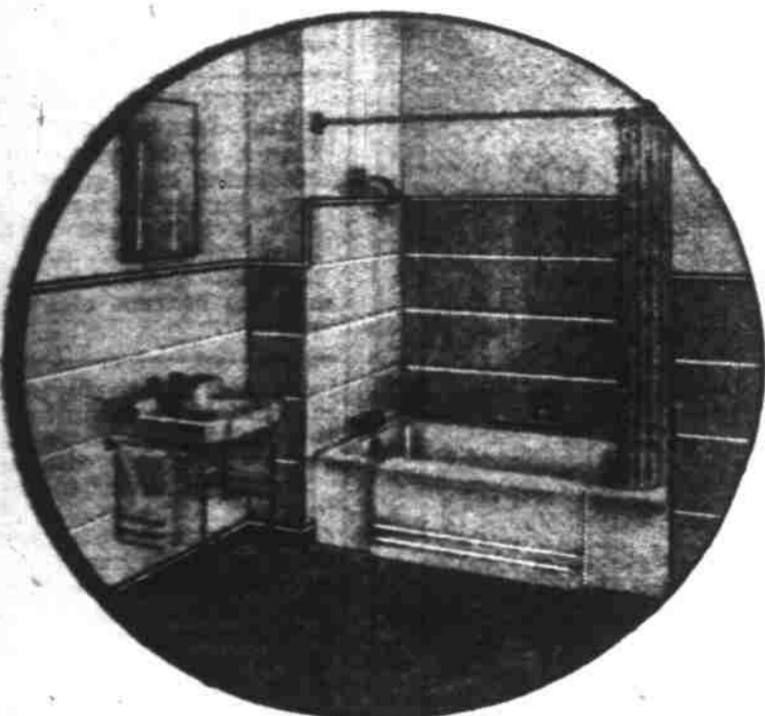
DOCK STRIKE IN BRAZIL
