## Tension Eased, Idaho River Starts Retreat

BONNERS FERRY, Idaho, June (A)-An air of confidence pervaded this area tonight as the swollen Kootenai river, which had threatened dikes guarding 40,000 acres of crop land, receded after crawling to within less than a foot of the tops of river barriers.

The river had dropped to 29 feet this evening, one foot and three inches under yesterday's crest, and Capt. Ray D. Besing, army officer who has been aiding in the battle against the river said "Unless we have heavy rains, it looks like we'll be all right.

The 90 miles of dikes still held firm and the crews of tired farmers and volunteers, many of whom have gone sleepless while battling numerous leaks in the silty dikes, were promised relief from another
