

U.S. Fishing Vessels to Join, Help Train Chinese Fleets

SEATTLE, June 1—(P)—Equipped with the most modern fishing gear, seven sturdy Puget Sound fishing vessels were ready today to sail on a voyage of more than 5000 miles to Shanghai where they will join the fishing fleets of China and operate off the stormy coast of Asia.

The fleet, organized and outfitted by UNRRA, is due to leave port tomorrow. Aboard the ships will be 49 men, including fishermen with long experience on the Pacific coast banks, who will spend five months on the China coast, training Chinese fishermen to operate the vessels and equipment.

UNRRA plans to send two additional fleets from San Francisco shortly. It is seeking 75 volunteer fishermen to sail with the latter convoys and is offering pay ranging from \$900 a month for skippers to \$600 for fishermen.

Each of the seven ships in the fleet has fresh provisions for three weeks and dry provisions for three months. Each is equipped with radio telephones, direction finders and tachometers. Commanding the fleet will be

LONDON, June 1—(P)—Dark-haired Doreen Davies stood in the crowded kitchen of a friend's house in North London tonight and was married by trans-Atlantic telephone to former GI Jack Murrell of Fort Worth, Texas.

The 15-minute ceremony— at one pound (\$4) per minute—was performed by a minister at the Texas end of the line with Doreen's father serving as proxy for the bridegroom here in London.

The wedding, half-hour late in starting because of connection difficulties, was completed without hitch.

When it was over, the bride cried into the phone: "Jack, darling, I'm so excited. I'll be seeing you very soon."

A machinist in a London factory, the 20-year-old bride was at work when the trans-Atlantic operator notified her of the coming call. Too excited to work or eat, she just went out, she said, and bought herself a wedding ring.

Trucks, Autos To Get 'Phones

PORTLAND, June 1—(P)—Radio-telephone service for trucks, buses and private automobiles will be tried experimentally this year in the Portland area, I. D. Winslow, district manager for Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company, said today.

He said the federal communications commission had granted permission for a radio-telephone station here.

Telephones will be placed conveniently in the vehicles, with switches for transmitter and receiver power located on the instrument panel. Bell and light signals will announce calls, Winslow explained. Vehicles thus equipped can receive calls from regular telephones, he said.

Opponents of Loan Heard

WASHINGTON, June 1—(P)—The opposition, spearheaded by Jesse Jones, former commerce secretary, will begin Monday the presentation of its case against the proposed \$3,750,000,000 British loan.

Jones, president of the Houston (Tex.) Chronicle, originally was scheduled to appear Tuesday before the house banking committee but said in Houston he will be unable to attend that day. The group will hear Hamilton Fish, former member of congress from New York, on Monday.

The committee probably will vote late next week on the legislation ratifying the transaction. The bill then will move to the house floor where administration leaders claim enough votes to pass it. The senate already has approved the legislation.

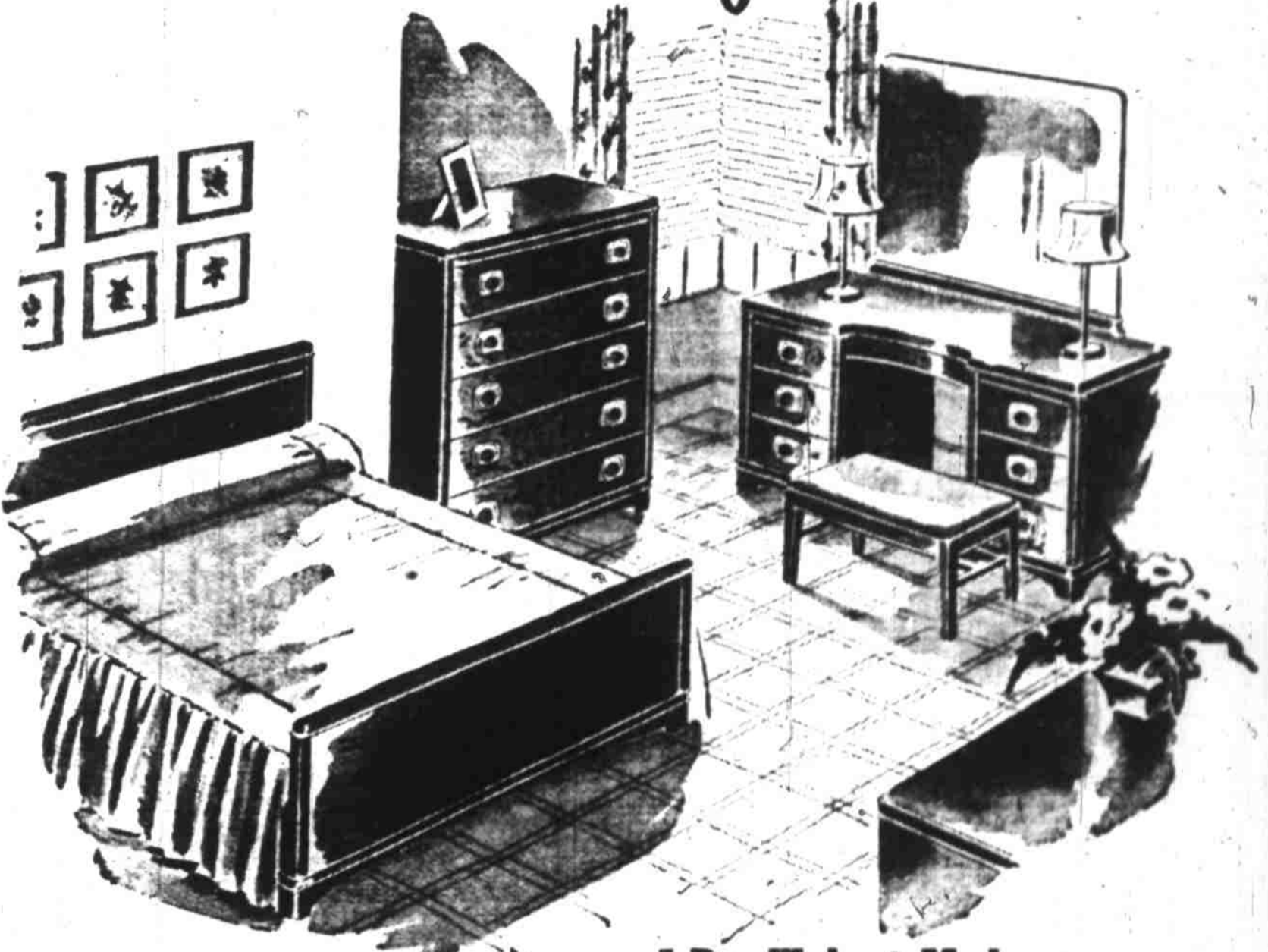
