Vets Asked to Check Clauses in Insurance

Ex-servicemen should examine their commercial insurance policies to be sure that any "war clauses" in effect during their service have been suspended, was the warning issued, Thursday by the state department of veterans' affairs.

Certain special benefit provisions such as double indemnity, waiver of premium or disability income in commercial policies may have been automatically terminated or suspended and veterans should apply in such cases to have these provisions restored, it was advised. Furthermore, veterans who served in the armed forces before Sept. 2, 1945, but failed to re-

port their status, may have paid premiums for provisions which were no longer in force, and it should be possible for them to obtain refunds, according to notices being sent out to policy holders by some companies. Veterans' Affairs officials said reinstatement of suspended provisions will not be made until the veteran notifies the company that he is discharged from the service, by terms of certain commercial contracts.
