

HOW THE UNITED STATES FLAG GREW UP

TODAY IS FLAG DAY!
SCHEME of the American flag came from British Meteor flag (1777)—red & field, blue Union Jack with symbolic crosses.

STRIPES (13, for the 13 colonies)
 turned up on Grand Union flag, raised at Cambridge, Mass., Jan. 1, 1776; its British Union Jack was outmoded by Declaration of Independence.

STARS (13, one for each colony)
 replaced Union Jack in flag adopted by Continental Congress June 14, 1777, and made by Betsy Ross; flag set said stars represented "a new constellation."

MORE stars and stripes were added
 with each new state till the 1814 Star-Spangled Banner, theme of national anthem, had 15 of each; but 1818 Congress limited the number of stripes to 13.

NEW STARS thereafter were added
 as new states joined union, last for Arizona in 1912; but if Hawaii, Alaska or Puerto Rico gets statehood, another star will have to be inserted in the flag.

It also offers instruction on the adult and junior levels.
