Ladino Clover Loan Rate Set

CORVALLIS, June 13 (AP)—The production and marketing administration reported today that a \$1.35 a pound loan rate on ladino clover has been set for 1946, a 15-cent reduction from last year's support price.

Most other loan rates are unchanged from last year, said E. Harvey Miller, administration chairman, but the rates for biennial sweet clover and farm-stored sudan grass were lowered a cent a pound.

More than 75,000 pounds of ladino clover were put under loan in Oregon last year, Miller said.
