It is just one day more than five years since they tangled the first time in the Polo grounds, just across the Harlem river from the stadium. Realizing he needed a knockout to keep his championship that night, Joe put the lights out for Billy in the 13th round, after Sweet William had piled up a commanding lead on his boxing skill and speed and supreme confidence that he can whip any man in the world using fists alone. The return match was a "natural" then. It's even more of a "seven-and-eleven" now, what with money as free as a night shirt flapping in the breeze on a clothes line, Louis apparently feeling his 32 years and Conn—developing late, like most Irish athletes—seemingly hitting his peak at 28.

This will be the 22nd time Joe has put the ring's richest bauble on the line since he hammered Cinderella Man Jim Braddock into unconsciousness nine years ago next Saturday to start the longest reign of any champion from the point of view of title defense. Yet old pop time and a four-year layoff since he put his gloves in mothballs and went on Uncle Sam's payroll have left their mark on him. He misses his friend and trainer, the late Jack Blackburn. He still packs the punch of a blockbuster, but in his training he has been a slow-moving target, thumped surprisingly freely—and often—by his sparring partners and still unable to "set" to punch when an opponent confuses him by sudden moves.

Trio in Knot For Golf Title

Bad Break Ruins Win For By; Playoff Set

CLEVELAND, June 15—(AP)—A penalty shot charged against him when his caddy accidentally kicked the ball on the 13th fairly during a third round contest. Byron Nelson the United States open golf championship today and sent him into a three-way playoff with Vic Ghezzi and Lloyd Mangrum for the first postwar title.

The three tournament veterans wound up the 72-hole medal play test with totals of 284—four under par. They will play off at 18 holes tomorrow at 10:30 a.m. (Eastern daylight time). Nelson won the championship on the playoff at Philadelphia in 1939 when three deadlocked at 284. After Nelson, Ghezzi and Mangrum had posted their final scores, Ben Hogan and Herman Barron needed only to par the last three holes to take over the lead by a stroke. Instead, Hogan lost a stroke to par at the 16th and 18th, and Barron was two over par for the last two holes. Hogan's finish gave him a par 72 and Barron's subpar 69 for a fourth place tie at 285.

Ed (Porky) Oliver and Jimmy Demaret wound up in a tie for sixth place with 286. Dick Metz and Melvin (323) Hartstork finished in a tie for eighth place with aggregates of 287. Lawson Little and E. J. (Dutch) Harrison finished with 289.


