Ruth Mitchell Brought Into Yugoslav Case

BELGRADE, June 20.—(AP)—A picture of Miss Ruth Mitchell, sister of the late Brig. Gen. William (Billy) Mitchell, was identified today by Dragi Jovanovic, police prefect in Belgrade during the Nazi occupation, as that of a person he had seen "with the Gestapo and Chetniks."

Miss Mitchell, said to have been the only foreign woman ever admitted to membership in the

Chetniks, returned to the United States in June, 1942. She had been a prisoner of the Germans for 14 months after her arrest in Yugoslavia, where she had lived for several years.

Jovanovic, a co-defendant at the treason trial of Gen. Draja Mihailovic, the Chetnik leader, made the identification at the prompting of the prosecutor, who asked "did she have any connection with the Gestapo?" "I don't know," Jovanovic answered.

The bringing of Miss Mitchell's name into the case was the second sensation of the day in the Yugoslav military court room.

Earlier Mihailovic dramatically denied that he had obtained money for his Chetnik fighters from the Quisling regime of the

Janet Fleischhauer has been appointed an instructor in the French department at Willamette university starting the fall term. It was announced Thursday by President G. Herbert Smith.

Recently completing her work for a master's degree at Oberlin college, Miss Fleischhauer will instruct courses in both French and

Spanish. In the absence of Marion Morange, present head of the French department, who will take a year's leave to study abroad under an AAUW fellowship.

A graduate of the University of Oregon, Miss Fleischhauer is the second instructor to be appointed to the university's Romance language department in recent weeks. Paul B. Bell will assume the position of assistant professor of Romance languages with the fall semester. He is currently a member of the University of Washington faculty.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 20.—(AP)—The forest service, noting a steadily growing number of mountain

scalers, decided today to make Mount Hood safe for the adventurous.

For the first time since pre-war days rangers will install a 1500-foot safety line to Mt. Hood's summit Sunday. The rope, to be carried up in coils, will give climbers something to cling to.
