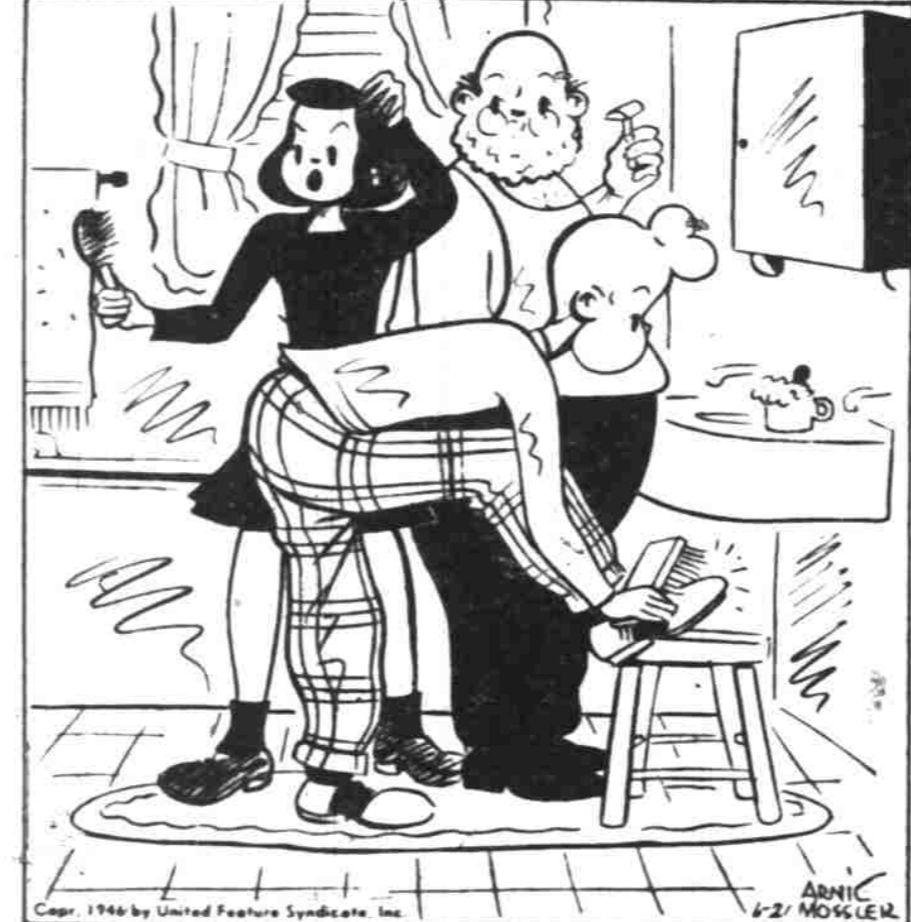
Shower Honors Miss Wolcott
