He is survived by his mother, Mrs. Robert Johnson of Buena Vista.

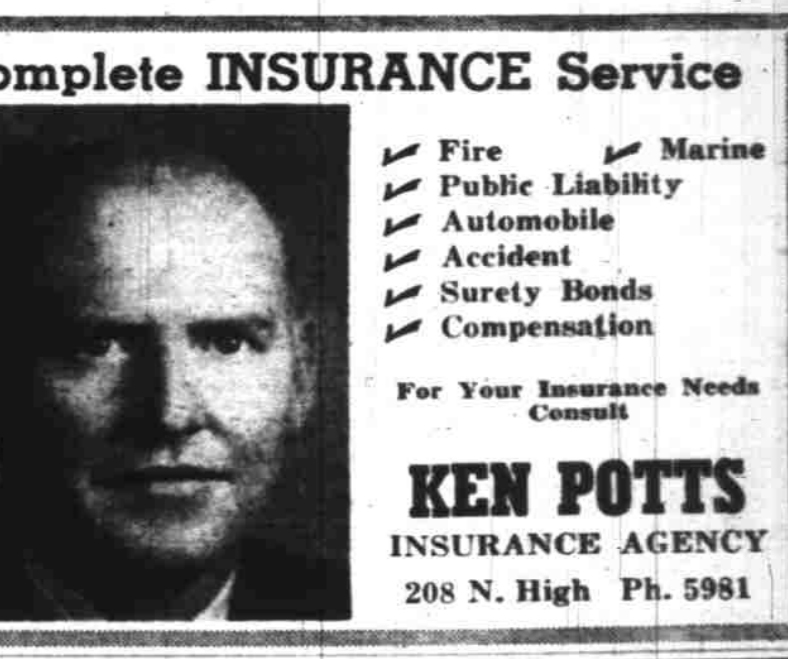
