Fire Destroys Bus After 500 Foot Dive

(See story on page one) ELLENSBURG, Wash., June 24 (AP)—Gus Hallbourg, a righthanded pitcher on the Spokane baseball team, who survived a crash of the club's chartered bus in the Cascade mountains tonight, said after being brought here: "Men were scattered all over the hill. I guess I was lucky."

He said the bus was carrying 15 members of the team besides the driver and he only saw four teammates around the wreck scene afterward — Levi McCormick, Irving Konopka, Leo Layden and Dick Powers. He said some of them were burned.

Hallbourg said he turned to Bob Kinnaman and said: "This would be a hell of a place to go over, wouldn't it?" I turned back and we were going through the fence.

"The bus caught fire almost right away as it rolled down. I must have been knocked down. You could see the rocks of the hillside flying past as we rolled. I rode her clear to the bottom."

"I guess I was knocked unconscious for a bit when we landed. When I came to the inside of the bus was all flames. I dove out through a window. When I left the bus was just ashes."
