

Russians Oppose Australian Proposals for Atomic Control

NEW YORK, July 12 (AP)—Soviet Russia fought for more than three hours today to block Australian proposals for machinery to put an atomic control plan, but was defeated on two measures and a third gave up on a third proposal.

The wily battle took place in a stormy three-hour closed meeting of the working committee of the United Nations atomic energy commission, which heard the Australian proposal.

Chairman, Australian Foreign Minister Herbert V. Evatt, rejected Russia's atomic control plan as "impossible."

Evatt Baruch Plans Similar

Evatt reporting on the work of a six-nation sub-committee, proposed a plan similar to that adopted by Bernard M. Baruch, the United States member.

One of the delegates, who did not wish to be identified, said Soviet Delegate Andrei A. Gromyko took issue with Evatt's report at one point because the Australian failed to mention Russia as one of the nations which had been helpful in the sub-committee's work.

Real Fight Begins

The real fight did not begin, however, until after Evatt had completed his report and Baruch had made a short speech endorsing his recommendations for an atomic control system.

The Russian delegation then moved down to far in discussions both in public and private meetings.

Gromyko was said to have protested almost every point in Evatt's proposals, accounting for the lengthy session.

Paralytic Found Hanging in Tree

LOS ANGELES, July 12 (AP)—Rudy Fieser, 17, both legs paralyzed since birth, pushed himself a yard back daily in a wagon hauled himself up an elm tree for exercise.

Today his mother, Mertie, found him hanging unconscious from the elm tree, strangled by a sack cord attached to a limb. He was dead when the ambulance reached a hospital.

Feinsinger held no formal meeting during the day, but discussed with the various interested unions the procedure for his investigation.

The Coos Bay dispute began when CIO longshoremen refused to work the American Pacific Steamship company's SS Mello Franco. They contended AFL crewmen were employed in some of the ship's departments usually filled by members of unions belonging to the CIO-dominated committee for maritime unity.

War Blamed For Poor China Distribution

SHANGHAI, July 12 (AP)—The director of the Chinese national relief and rehabilitation administration declared today the ravages of war — not politics — had damned the flow of food to China's starving millions.

The director, T. F. Tsang, told newsmen he had instructed his representative in Washington to try to persuade UNRRA Director General LaGuardia to rescind an order reducing relief for needy China.

Tsang styled "misleading" allegations that only half of one per cent of Chinese relief filtered through government blockades to stricken communist areas.

"Local interference by both sides" was conceded, but Tsang declared these violated orders issued by both Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek and the communist command.

9 Reclamation Projects Aided

BOISE, Idaho, July 12 (AP)—Nine reclamation projects in Idaho, Oregon, Washington and western Montana will benefit from the 1947 department of interior appropriations bill signed by President Truman, R. J. Newell, regional director for the U.S. bureau of reclamation at Boise announced today.

Work planned for the projects includes:

Owyhee project, Oregon—Completion of the Fletcher-Gulch wasteway, laterals and drainage systems under a \$125,000 appropriation.

Deschutes project, Oregon—Construction of the 50,000-acre north unit will be almost completed under a \$1,716,837 appropriation.

Son of Frisco Stock Exchange Head Guilty

REDWOOD CITY, Calif., July 12 (AP)—Ronald F. Kaehler, Jr., 23, son of the San Francisco stock exchange president, was convicted of manslaughter tonight after two hours and 45 minutes jury deliberation.

Kaehler was charged with slaying Lloyd W. Stone, 25, a cook, after a drinking party at Kaehler's apartment on April 2.

Cherries End, Beans Next on Harvest Slate

Cherry picking is rapidly drawing to a close and string beans will be the next big crop to be harvested in this area, the Marion county farm labor office reported.

In reviewing the past month's statistics, the office estimated there were 150 per cent more cherries this year than last.

The number of farmers and the number of orders for workers placed in the Salem farm labor office were as follows: Salem 338 farmers, 4658 orders; Woodburn 87 farmers, 1256 orders; Silverton, 25 farmers and 558 orders. Youths placed during June from Salem totaled 2687; Woodburn 235 and Silverton 208. Platoon of younger workers supervised by an older person were used, Gladys Turnbull, farm labor assistant, said.

The total amount of seasonal workers was 7256; divided as follows: 2837 men, 1042 women, 3130 youths and 247 Mexicans. This is a 2194 increase in placements over 1945.

500 at Buyers' Strike Meeting

PORTLAND, July 12 (AP)—While butter prices sagged and pickets protested price boosts, some 500 Portlanders turned out for a "buyers' strike rally" here tonight.

The rally audience, after hearing speakers declare that prices would zoom if the OPA is once permanently buried, voted to urge Oregon congressmen to back effective price control.

Richard L. Neuberger, Portland author and keynote speaker, declared that a "buyers' strike" wouldn't work and suggested a special legislative session to enact price control.

Senate Rejects Rise in Silver

WASHINGTON, July 12 (AP)—For a third time, the senate today rejected, 54 to 25, a house proposal to sell treasury silver at 71.11 cents an ounce.

The rally audience, after hearing speakers declare that prices would zoom if the OPA is once permanently buried, voted to urge Oregon congressmen to back effective price control.

Meanwhile thousands of treasury and postoffice employees may have to wait for their pay checks. Funds to meet them are in the \$1,600,000,000 appropriation bill which has been deadlocked for two months by the congressional silver dispute.

VA to Review Special Cases

The veterans administration will review the cases of veterans who have had entitlement under the GI bill deducted for time spent in the army specialized training program or the navy V-12 program, it was announced by Wayne F. Smith, Salem VA training officer.

Under a new directive from Washington, D. C., it is now possible, in some cases, to credit veterans for time spent in these training programs, Smith said. Hereafter the VA has deducted all time spent in V-12 or ASTP. Veterans affected by the new ruling were urged to write the VA immediately in order to speed up action in the reconsideration of their cases.

Italy Parties Form Cabinet

ROME, July 12 (AP)—Italy's major political parties succeeded late tonight in composing their differences and in assigning portfolios for the country's first republican cabinet.

Alcide De Gasperi, leader of Italy's number one political party — the Christian democrats — who was asked 10 days ago by President Enrico De Nicola to form the new government, retained the presidency of the council of ministers and also took over the much sought-after ministry of interior. His party also received six other cabinet positions.

Lumber Baron Dies in East

ST. PAUL, Minn., July 12 (AP)—Rudolf M. Weyerhaeuser, 78, pioneer leader in the Minnesota lumber industry, died at his home early today. He had been suffering from a heart ailment for several weeks.

Weyerhaeuser, born in Coal Valley, Ill., entered the lumber business at Rock Island, Ill., in 1881 with a brother, John. He was president of the Potlatch Forests Inc., Lewiston, Idaho; chairman of the board of Northwest Paper Co., Clouet; a director of Weyerhaeuser Timber Co., Northern Pacific railway, and the First National bank of St. Paul.

21 More Jews Slain in Poland

WARSAW, July 12 (AP)—Twenty-one more Jews have been killed in fresh outbreaks of persecution, government reports said today, and violence against Jews appeared to be spreading despite government efforts at suppression.

Officials blamed outlawed bands hiding in forests for the latest killings, which occurred on highways and trains between Lodz and Breslau.

Jews have been dragged from automobiles and trains and shot by groups which the government declared were "fascist reactionaries" such as NSZ bandits.

Charges of Subversive Activity in A-Plants Labelled 'Preposterous'

OAK RIDGE, Tenn., July 12 (AP)—Charges by the house committee on un-American activities that members of Oak Ridge scientific societies had engaged in "subversive activities" were described as "preposterous" today by three scientists who added:

"They (the house committee) are raising a red herring in an attempt to block action by the house rules committee on the McMahon bill for control of atomic energy."

Stop-Work Meet Slated To Protest Check Delay

PORTLAND, July 12 (AP)—Longshoremen here scheduled a 10 a.m. Monday stop-work meeting after advisement that retroactive pay checks will not be issued by CIO dock secretary Maurice Fisher said today.

The checks, Fisher reported, would range from \$200 to \$1000 for men regularly employed back to Oct. 1, 1944.

The checks ready, R. E. Ferguson, manager of the Waterfront Employers' association said, but cannot be issued until government agencies post funds to cover them.

Dispute Proves No Deterrent To Road Work

County road work will not be delayed by a dispute over ownership of the land near Coffee bar in the Willamette river where Marion county is getting rock.

County officials said Friday after a conference with the disputing parties.

The county will proceed with the work and if Muri Smidt, who claims to own the land for which Herman Coyle has contracted with the county, wishes to start legal action, ownership of the land will be established and a jury will assess damages, they announced.

Coyle signed the original contract and when Smidt claimed ownership a supplemental contract was filed with him by the county court. Coyle represents that he and his predecessors had title to the land for over 80 years and he is now the sole owner. The Smidt contract will be held in abeyance, the court said.

Marines Near China Fighting

NANKING, July 12 (AP)—Chinese communists were reported attacking or massing troops today around three north China cities where U.S. marines stand guard, dispatches from Peiping asserted.

As General Marshall conferred with Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek on what was believed to be a new compromise, reports poured in of battles in potentially explosive north China.

One account said communists were attacking immediately south of the Shantung port of Taingtiao, where marines only recently prepared defense positions for eventualities.

Another report said the communists had massed heavily in the areas of the two Hopei cities of Peiping and Tientsin, to the northwest of Taingtiao, where other marines are on duty.

Heirens Print Matches Again

CHICAGO, July 12 (AP)—State's Attorney William J. Tuohy said today a fingerprint of William Heirens, who is under investigation in the Suzanne Degnan kidnapping, had been matched with one found in the apartment of Frances Brown, Chicago's "lipstick murder" victim.

Miss Brown, 33 year old former Wave, was shot and stabbed to death Dec. 11 by and intruder who wrote in lipstick on the wall of her north side apartment, "For heaven's sake catch me before I kill more. I can't control myself."

Tuohy made the announcement shortly after a Cook county grand jury indicted Heirens, 17 year old University of Chicago student, on 29 counts of burglary, robbery and assault to kill. None of the indictments involved the Degnan or Brown cases.

100 MELONS STOLEN

Near 100 watermelons were stolen from a boxcar parked at Trade and Church streets, Salem police learned Thursday. Melons were reportedly consigned to Safeway Stores.

AFL-CIO Dispute Halts UNRRA Ships

NEW YORK, July 12 (AP)—Twelve merchant ships—four of them waiting to sail with UNRRA relief supplies—were stalled in New York harbor today by a CIO-AFL tug-of-war which threatened to paralyze east coast shipping.

Seventy-five other vessels temporarily were immobilized as AFL seamen, said by union spokesmen to be 5,000 strong, left their jobs to picket CIO-manned vessels in retaliation against a CIO boycott of AFL-Manned ships on the west coast.

20 Tumble in Truck Mishap

WALLA WALLA, Wash., July 12 (AP)—A picnic for youthful strawberry pickers ended tragically here late last night when the truck in which they were riding overturned at an intersection. Five girls were hospitalized for more serious injuries but all were reported to be improving today. Fifteen other youngsters ranging in age from 10 to 15 were suffering from shock and minor cuts.

Patrolmen said the youngsters were standing in the truck and the accident was caused when they shifted their weight to the other side of the vehicle as it rounded the corner.

Senate Group Modifies UNRRA Censorship Ban

WASHINGTON, July 12 (AP)—The senate appropriations committee tonight re-wrote a house-approved news censorship ban in sending to the senate a \$2,700,000 money bill carrying \$465,000,000 to finance UNRRA activities for the remainder of the year.

The senate committee provided, in effect, that countries which already have news censorship may retain such restraints without losing UNRRA aid, but must agree not to delete or modify dispatches concerning UNRRA activities.

WIFE-KISSER SENTENCED
MARTINSVILLE, Va., July 12 (AP)—Amon J. Guler, a mild-looking middle-aged furniture plant mechanic who covertly kissed a fellow worker's wife two years ago and pleaded he lived in fear of the consequences, was found guilty by a jury today of the dynamite bomb death of J. Russell Smith and his punishment was fixed at death in the electric chair.
