### Dwight Smith Hospitalized

**STAYTON**, July 21—Dwight Smith, 21, Jordan, is in a serious condition in a Salem hospital following an automobile accident which occurred Wednesday, a short distance from the Linn county bridge at the junction of the Stayton road. Leo Sergys, 28, and his wife Elsie, 21, Jordan, occupants of the car, were also hospitalized. A defective front brake caused the accident, it was reported.

Smith was the most seriously hurt. He sustained head and shoulder injuries, lacerations about the body, was at last reported to be improving. Sergys, who was at the wheel, and owner of the car, received a back injury, lacerations of the face and head. His wife was bruised and shaken up and suffered knee lacerations. She was later taken to her parents home in Salem.
