After a trip to the Oregon coast the newlyweds will be at home in Salem.

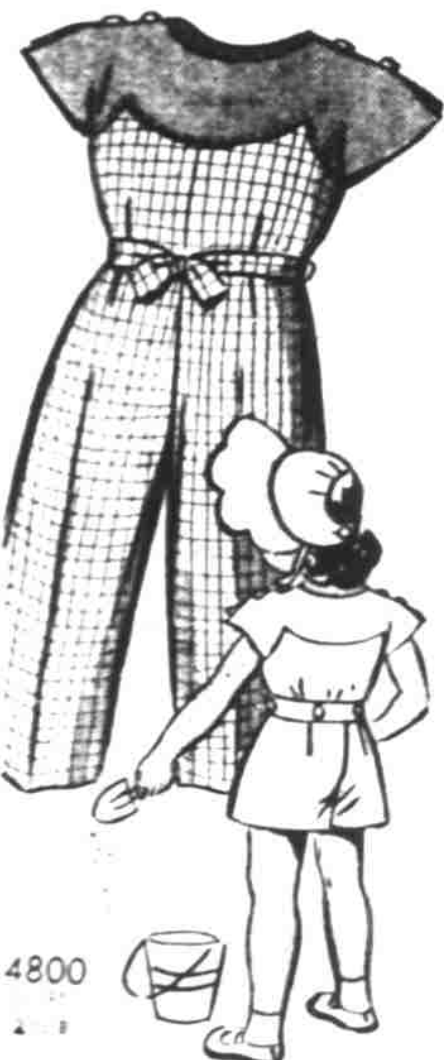
Shower for Bride
