### Good Eating

### Fruits of Late Summer Provide Ideas For Variety of Cobblers, Puddings

Fruit desserts are timely and there's possibility for plenty of variety in the meal's ending these summertime days. Tart red berries, green apples, peaches, apricots and plums, all make family delights. The only problem is sugar! Having supply of biscuit mix ready and waiting for the milk to be added, speeds up summertime cobblers and dumplings. You can either buy the mix ready-prepared or double or triple your own biscuit recipe, omit the liquid and put it away in a carton to keep until ready to use.

Adding salt to fruit brings out the sweetness and makes it possible to cut down on the sugar. Leftover jellies or jams, especially those which may have crystallized, can be added to the fruit for additional sweetness — and often interesting flavor.

Fresh peaches sliced and flavored slightly with cinnamon make a good cobbler when slightly thickened with cornstarch and cooked in a casserole topped with biscuit dough.

Here's an applesauce pudding that might be the answer to today's dessert problem.

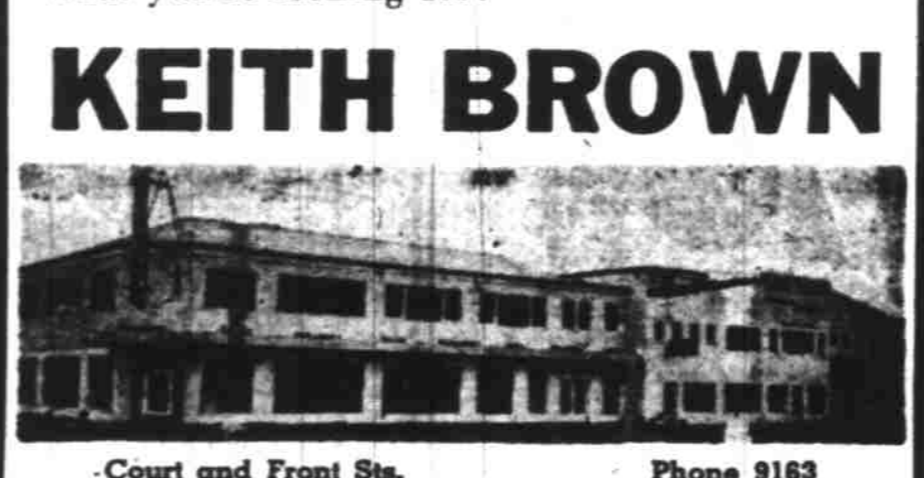
