

Timber Salvage Plan Explained

EUGENE, Aug. 12 (AP)—Timber can be salvaged from northwest Oregon cuttings by portable sawmills already in operation, a Willamette national forest official suggested today after a tour of northwest Oregon and southwest Washington.

Timber is being salvaged from cutover lands at the rate of 15,000 board feet per acre, some 20 percent of the original yield, Carl Hildman, in charge of timber management, said.

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AFL Calls for Congressional Housecleaning

CHICAGO, Aug. 12 (AP)—The executive council of the American Federation of Labor today called for "a sweeping congressional housecleaning" and directed that "the political activities of the AFL, both on local and national bases, be expanded and intensified."

The council, at its quarterly meeting, said in a statement that "it should be emphasized that the AFL will continue its non-partisan political policy," but that national AFL headquarters would be directed to compile voting records of congressmen seeking reelection.

The council statements said, in part: "It's (congress) failure to provide for nursing needs during reconversion, its shameful subservience to lobbyists for special interests, its legislative assaults against the masses of American workers, sound a warning how our democratic system can be stifled when congress is unresponsive to the will of the people."

Union County Utility Buy Held Illegal

PORTLAND, Aug. 13 (AP)—The Union county people's utility district was enjoined by Circuit Judge James W. Crawford today from continuing its purchase program to buy the California-Electric Utilities company.

The judge held that the transaction, to have been consummated Aug. 15, was illegal, and that none of a \$925,000 bond issue voted in 1942 could be used for the purpose. Gus Solomon, Portland, attorney for the PUD, meanwhile, said the case would be appealed to the supreme court.

The bond authorization was for \$925,000 the judge said, while the purchase price of properties to have been bought amounted to more than \$1,250,000.

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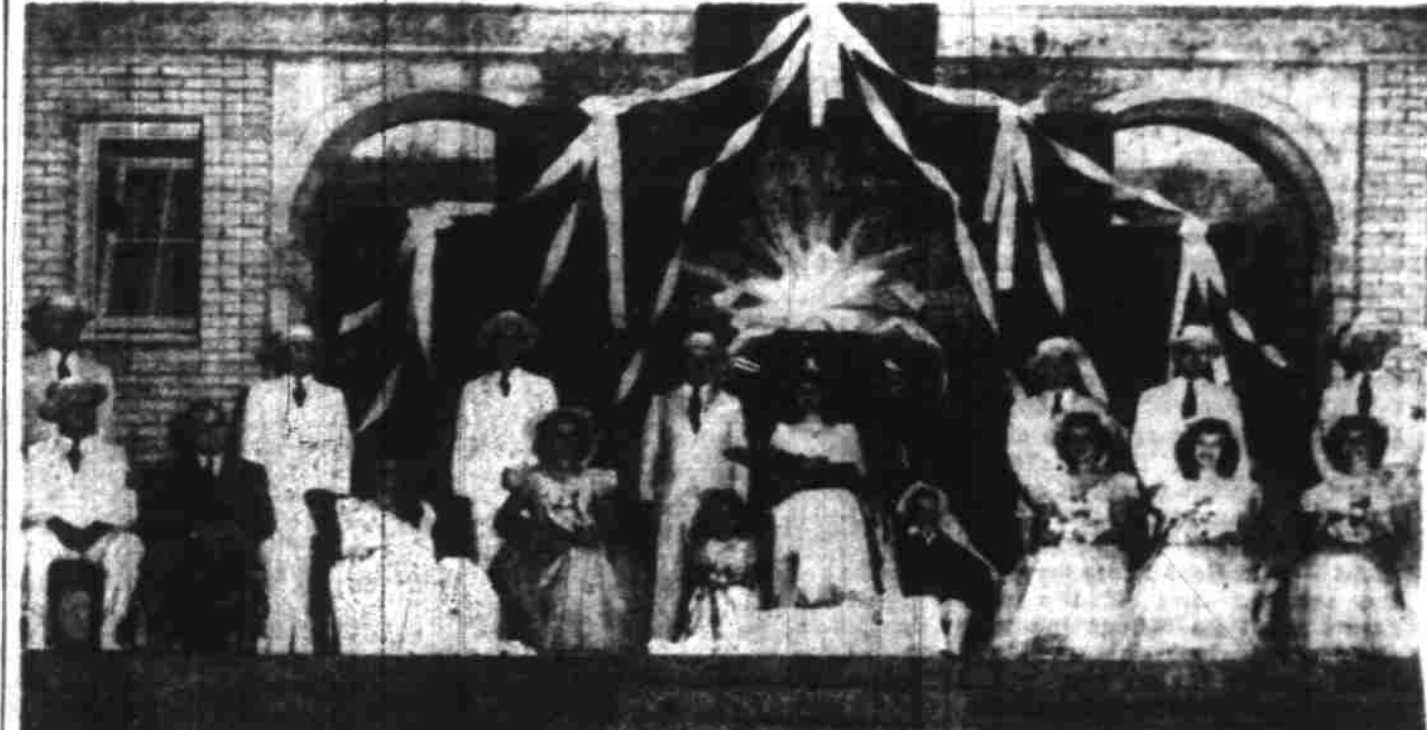
CIO Workers Change to AFL
