Bearcat Prospects 'Pretty Good'; 19 Lettermen to Greet Erickson

The Bearcat is beginning to stir from his summer-long sleep, for its getting along about that time of year. And, no doubt Mr. Bearcat has been enjoying some rather sweet dreams of the grid. For in the words of Walt Erickson, Willamette's brand new football mentor, "Prospects look pretty good."

With the first peacetime campaign in five years looming, Erickson estimates that 50 odd gridsters will answer his initial practice call on September 10—just 17 days before the San Jose curtain-raiser. And among that respectable number will be 19

lettermen. Which isn't exactly a cause for mourning.

This group includes 10 linemen and nine backs—and there's plenty of weight and speed there. Lettermen expected to make bold bids for first team spots in the line include Marv Goodman, 190; Marshall Barbour, 178; and Bill Reeder, 165 at the ends; Bob Denavon, 215, guard; Paul Cook-Ingham, 205, Hank Ercolini, 220, Joe Dispenziere, 240, Garrell Delner, 212, and Martin Barstad, 216, at tackles; Pat White, 200, center. In the backfield, where there are ample candidates and plenty of talent in both the running and passing departments there will be Ted Ogdash, 200 pound halfback, who has no peer

at the running game on the coast; Larry McKeel, 187 pounds of soeking fullback; "Churnin' Chuck" Furno; Bobby Douglas and Cecil Curries, who are adept at the passing trade; Rex Hardy, Salem high product; and Ken Jacobsen and Darrell Lewis, all capable runners; and Conrad Faylock, a good blocking back.

In addition Erickson has some promising material coming up from the freshmen ranks, and from the transfer lists. Men in this category include Bill Withers, Grant High; Lowell Yeager, Scio; Robert Lakin, a good passer; and transfer from the Washington; John Salapchik, West Virginia, who played service ball and who is rated an outstanding

kicker; Howard Lorenz, Camas high; and John Fletcher, Benson Tech. Linemen include Johnny Williams, Herb Johnson, Howard Olsen and Ray Loder, guards; Robert Hill, center; Robert Tierman, Independence high and Ernest Miller, 200 pound Salem high graduate, tackles; and Charles Patterson, end.

Erickson, in his inaugural year at college coaching, will employ a variation of the double wing-back formation. Surveying his material he reasons that he will have sufficient strength in the forward wall and in the running and passing departments to capitalize fully on the possibilities offered by this form of attack.

On paper the starting line this year should average well over 200 pounds, with fair experience at every position. The backfield should offer a threat in every phase of the attack.

"I feel," says Erickson, "that some of the boys may have slowed down a little since they've lost several years because of the war. However, I believe this is more than made up for in the added thinking ability they've gained."

900 to Shoot In Amateur Go

NEW YORK, Aug. 13 (AP)—With approximately 900 golfers scheduled to compete in sectional tests, the qualifying field for the national amateur championship at Springfield, N. J., Sept. 9-14, will be the third largest in history, it was announced tonight as the USGA closed the entry books.

Although no accurate tabulation can be completed until the entries are received from Honolulu, where Hawaiian qualifying trials were held today, Secretary Joe Dey of the USGA said the list would total at least 900, a figure reached only twice before. Marvin (Bud) Ward of Spokane, Wash., who won the last championship in 1941 as well as in 1939, and half a dozen other former titleholders are exempt from qualifying.

NEW YORK, Aug. 13 (AP)—The Brooklyn Dodgers were rained out of their game with the New York Giants tonight but nonetheless picked their National League lead for a full game over the St. Louis Cardinals as the Redbirds were going down, 1-0, at Chicago; Johnny Schmitz of the Cubs stopped the hard-hitting Cards with three hits and bested Harry (The Cat) Brecheen, who allowed five blows. Schmitz failed to stop Stan Musial's hitting spree, however, as the Cardinal first sacker doubled in the first inning.

In the only other National League game, the Cincinnati Reds suffered their eighth straight setback, and fourth in a row to Pittsburgh as the Bucs hacked out a 3-2 win at Pittsburgh. The Philadelphia-at-Boston game was rained out.

Dave (Boo) Ferriss, Boston Red Sox sophomore, stole what show there was in the American league for the day by notching his twelfth win of the season in a night game at Philadelphia. Ferriss, in hanging up his eighth win in a row, beat the A's, 7-5 before 17,033. The win elevated the Soxers another half game ahead of the Yankees, who were rained out of their game with Washington. The Detroit-Cleveland game was also rained out.

At St. Louis, the Chicago White Sox took two from the Browns in the league's first twilight-night doubleheader of the season, 3-2 and 2-1.

The tourney's other favorites—Louise Suggs of Lithia Springs, Ga., and Mrs. Mildred (Babe) Diddrickson Zaharias of Denver—lived up to form and triumphed without much trouble.
