The story of the second tilt could be told in two words — Senators' victory. The Senators whacked three Vancouver hurlers for 16 runs, 11 hits, and 11 errors. The attack being a big eight-run first inning. Bill Schable was credited with the victory, his seventh of the year.



Ferriss Wins 21st; Bums Idle But Gain

BOSTON, Aug. 17—(AP)—The Boston Red Sox are finally demonstrating their superiority on the field of battle with the New York Yankees. The Sox blasted the Yanks 7 to 4, yesterday for their second straight win over the New Yorkers and did it with the aid of Ted Williams 32nd homer and Dave Ferriss' seven-hit hurling. It was Ferriss' 21st mound triumph. The Detroit Tigers moved within one game of the second-place Yanks as they trimmed the St. Louis Browns, 7 to 2 in the strength of a 14-hit attack off three Brownie pitchers. At Cleveland the Chicago White Sox finally stopped Bobby Feller, 4 to 1, but had to have the aid of three Indian errors to do it. The Washington Senators and the Philadelphia Athletics split a doubleheader, the Solons taking the first game, 12 to 7 and the A's nabbing the night-cap, 5 to 3.

Her mates of Crystal Plunge, San Francisco, immediately took the team leadership away from Multnomah club of Portland, Ore., for whom Miss McCrae formerly competed, with 27 points to MAC's 20.

Charles Sava, Crystal Plunge coach, said he withdrew his breaststroke star from further competition in the meet at AAU officials' request after they received a report she drank a glass of beer in a tavern restaurant last night in nearby Junction.

Miss McCrae said she did not want to comment because it might jeopardize her future AAU standing, but she added "I'm 22 years old and I don't feel that I did anything wrong." She did not deny she had taken a drink.

Ann Curtis, Crystal Plunge's great freestyle swimmer, beat her old rival from Multnomah, Brenda Helsler, to keep her championship in the 400-meter individual freestyle race and then anchored the winning 800-meter freestyle relay team.

Multnomah's great "buddy" team of Nancy Meeki and Suzanne Zimmermann, who sell women's clothing in the same Portland department store, picked up two more championships for Multnomah.

Miss Meeki won the 20-meter breaststroke in 3:15, and Miss Zimmermann captured the 100-meter backstroke in 1:18.
