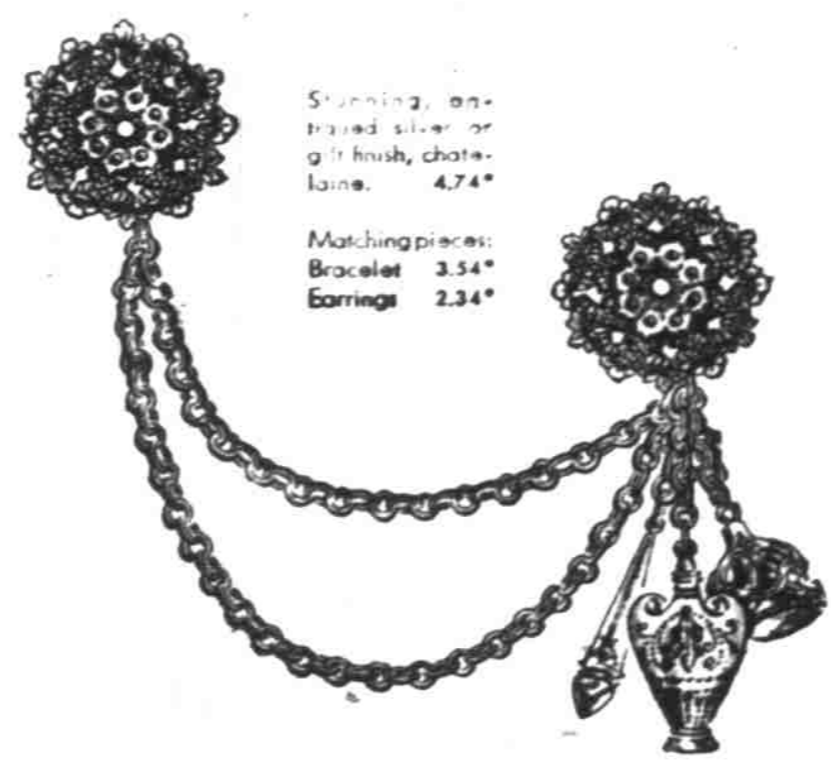

Raye Greive, University of Oregon medical student, has joined the medical staff at the Oregon state hospital.

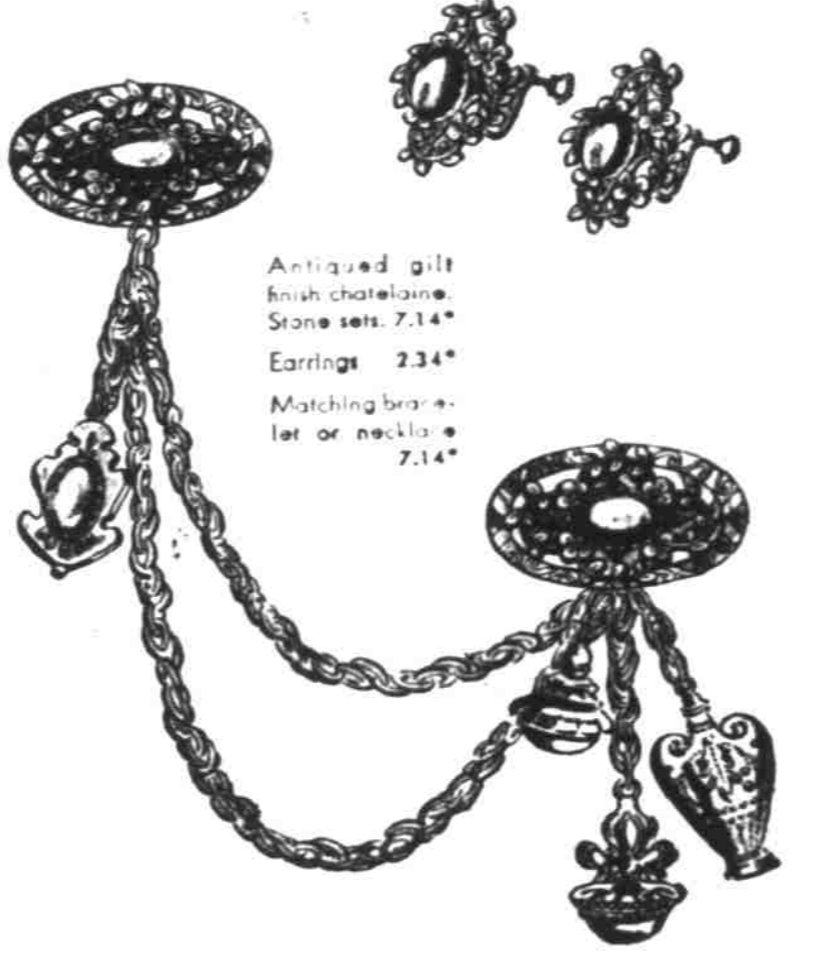
