

Grains Firm in Slow Market

CHICAGO, Aug. 29 (AP)—In a market which was distinguished by the lack of selling orders, prices were mostly firm today. The nearby contracts at wheat and oats showed the most activity, reflecting small shipments from the country because of the local shortage.

Interest as reasons for the quiet strength were advances in poultry prices, good weather over much of the corn belt, higher ceilings on eggs and cattle not being expected. The commodities market might cause its buying price for lambs export wheat.

The bread cereal finished 1/4 cent higher, January \$1.34 1/2, corn \$1.34 1/2, soybeans \$1.34 1/2, and a bushel were about 1/4 cent higher, September 75 1/2.

Scattered commission house buying caused the uptick in January wheat, which gained 1/2 cent at one time. Traders said part of the bread cereal strength could be attributed to technical trading following yesterday's 5-cent break. Total North American supply of wheat this week was 136,350,000 bushels against 349,671,000 last year.

Annual parity on August 15 was \$1.50 against \$1.76 a month earlier. \$2.31 against \$1.28, oats \$1.44 against \$1.24 cents and barley \$1.26 against \$1.23. Cash markets were steady.
