**Byrnes Urges Germans Vote On Constitution**

STUTTGART, Sept. 6 —(AP)—In formulating United States future policy toward Germany in a much-heralded speech here today, Secretary of State James Byrnes emphasized the following principal points:  
1. The United States wants early establishment of a provisional government for Germany "not hand picked" by other governments and charged with drafting a federal constitution to be submitted to the German people for ratification.  
2. In some aspects the speech was a reply to the July 10 statement of Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov, who called for a central German regime but said a federal government or any dismemberment of Germany should be projected only after a later plebiscite showed the people's sentiment.  
3. The United States will support revision of Germany's eastern borders in Poland's favor but "the extent of the area to be ceded must be determined when the final settlement is agreed upon."  
4. France should not be denied the Saar "but so far as the United States is aware the people of the Ruhr and the Rhenland desire to remain united with the rest of Germany. And the United States will not oppose their desire."  
5. The allies should make clear to the Germans immediately the essential terms of the peace settlement they expect the Germans to accept and observe.  
6. The United States will continue to work for complete economic unification of Germany, with zonal barriers "completely obliterated so far as the economic life and activity in Germany are concerned."

**County Roads To Be Graded**

**Bar Warned of Socialism Tide**

EUGENE, Sept. 6 —(AP)—The president of the Oregon state bar asserted at the bar convention today that establishment of socialized medicine might open the door for socialization of law and other professions.  
James T. Donald told 200 attorneys there was a "rising tide of national socialism in America," and urged the group to guard against it.  
Besides United States developments, Donald cited the British labor government's program as a sign post pointing toward socialism. "No one appreciates more than the members of the American bar," he said, "how important an English precedent can be."
