He is a graduate of Ohio State university and has taught 15 years in Ohio, was superintendent of Grafton township school, near Cleveland, and Fairview Junior high school near Youngstown, and during the war he taught in Balboa, Panama, Canal Zone.

James A. Lodge, health and physical education teacher, football, basketball and baseball coach comes from Nebraska where he coached in Rushville and Chadron. He is a graduate of Nebraska Teachers college, and finished high school in Sturgis, South Dakota.

Mary Ella Cary of Coquille, graduate of Maryhurst college, with graduate work at the University of Oregon, will be girls physical education instructor and will also teach English. She has been a nurse for more than seven years.

Arrangements for this were made Sunday when 30 members of the county club gathered at the Herbert Coleman home in West Woodburn. Floyd Bates, president, and O. C. Welsh, secretary, both of Salem, were in charge of the meeting.

A committee, including William Schwarz, Silvertown; Albert Cline, Aunsville; Fred Davis, Woodburn; Bob Clark, Aurora; Otto Beatty, Salem; and Stanley Riches, Turner, will assist Jim Bishop, 4-H county leader, in selecting the club member eligible for the calf. Bishop said the club year was completed. The winner is selected through points won in the season's club work.

Bates reported that the Ladd & Bush bank will furnish the cup for the winner at the spring Jersey show. This cup goes to Ronald Barnick, reports show.

New classifications for the 4-H members in the spring show were also discussed Sunday with a number of cattle club members urging that the calf groups and the junior and senior yearling form the junior championship class and all others the senior class. Final decision will be made prior to the 1947 show.
