Meat of the Matter

Local Walnut Pinch Hits for Meat In Main Dishes: Ingenuity Helps

No need to worry too much about shortages of meat, for many persons who live entirely without it seem healthy and happy. Mamma's brainwork may be a little bit more strenuous though, for working up meatless dishes sometimes takes more thought and effort than plunking a steak or chop in the frying pan.

Now take walnuts for instance, they make a good meat substitute and there is many a spare nut in many a house wanting to be used up before the new crop from backyard trees is harvested.

WALNUT LOAF

2 cups breadcrumbs
 1 cup walnuts (chopped coarsely)
 2 small onions
 1 carrot
 2 eggs
 Salt and pepper
 Sprinkling of sage
 Mix, add enough milk to make moist but not soggy (about 2 cups)
 Bake in a loaf pan for about 45 minutes to an hour at 350.

Another meat substitute is:

NUT HASH

1 cup chopped nuts
 2 cups cooked potatoes (cold)
 1/2 onion, chopped
 1 tablespoon browned flour
 1/2 cup cream or tomato puree
 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
 1 tablespoon sage
 Mix ingredients and heat in an oiled pan in the oven or on top of stove. Half cup chopped olives may be added. May add green peppers too.

There are many more meat substitutes, which we can discuss in future articles such as eggs, cottage cheese, cheese and others.
