

Stayton Garden Show Wins High Praise; Entries Total 116

STAYTON, Sept. 20 (Special)—Stayton's garden show in general and Mrs. A. D. Gardner in particular received high praise from Mrs. H. G. Stator, Portland, widely known flower arrangement authority, who assisted in the judging at the annual Stayton Garden club flower show Friday and spoke during the afternoon.

Two arrangements of Mrs. Gardner's were used by Stator to demonstrate proper scale, texture and color in flower arrangement. Mrs. Gardner placed first in the low yellow, the high all green and high mixed arrangement. There were 116 entries.

Mrs. Stator, whose talk centered around competitive arrangements at the show, stressed design, insisting that if a flower arrangement did not have design it was "just a good horticultural display—if it was good." She told how yellow flowers or grey foliage often will clear the colors which do not quite harmonize in an arrangement. She urged the use of "foreign foliage," and having the tips of foliage stems turn in general arrangements upward to avoid appearance of wilting. And grouping of colors, rather

than scattering them through a bouquet, is very important, she added.

The speaker was introduced by Mrs. W. A. Ingles, chairman of the show. Assisting Mrs. Ingles were Mrs. Andrew Fery, Mrs. Wendell Weddle and Mrs. George Miller. A special guest was Mrs. Earl Miller, one-time member of the Stayton Garden club, but now of Portland, who judged the horticultural division.

Stayton Enrolls 500 in Schools Opening Day

STAYTON—Five hundred students enrolled in the Stayton public and parochial schools September 16. The high school showed a slight increase in figures, while the grade school dropped from last year's enrollment, while St. Mary's school has practically the same number as in 1945. Two teachers for the two remaining high school vacancies have been obtained.

One hundred ninety-three students registered at high school, Freshman and sophomores, 57 each; juniors, 49 and seniors 30, or two more than last year.

Eighty-seven Marion county students have enrolled. Sister Mary Zita gave the following figures: first, 22; second, 20; third, 26; fourth, 24; fifth, 19; sixth, 19; seventh, 19; eighth, 14.

More are expected to enroll later after harvest work has slackened.
