"No Favor Spawns Us, No Fear Shall Awe"
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Final Clarification Needed

The decision of Judge Duncan that three state legislators were not legally holding their other offices on state commissions was not surprising in view of the rather plain language in article 3 section 1 of the Oregon constitution. But by virtue of previous interpretations by the state supreme court it would be well to have this particular case referred to the higher judicial body for final judgment.

Counsel for the three legislators had not contended they were entitled to hold two offices. The major point at issue was which ones they were entitled to keep. Counsel contended that by accepting administrative appointments the men had automatically vacated their legislative posts. But Judge Duncan held that since they were legislators at the times of their appointments to state boards they could not have legally accepted and held such appointments.

Some years ago the state supreme court in a similar but not identical case held that a judge who accepted another office had automatically surrendered his original post by so doing. It was to this decision which counsel for the three legislators pointed in declaring that the defendants were entitled to their state commission jobs.

Judge Duncan did well to reiterate that Senators Chessman and Strayer and Representative Hill were men of such "recognized ability and integrity" that there is no point whatever at issue except the law itself. It is true that either the legislative or the administrative branch of state government is going to be the loser, whatever the final decision. But such might not always be the case, with lesser personalities involved, and a clarification is needed.

They're All in Oregon

Highly-publicized Mt. Hood, not as lofty but more beautiful than many another snowpeak in the far west, is finally "arriving" as one of the great tourist attractions, as well as an outstanding Oregon playground, on the Pacific slope.

Million-dollar Timberline lodge, a WPA project of 10 years ago and now under lease from the government by a private corporation of business interests, is increasingly popular as the scene for smaller conventions, as well as being one of the state's outstanding showplaces for visitors. Its 150,000-mile-long ski lift all summer has carried thrill-loving tourists over the rock-strewn gullies which this winter again will be filled with snow. Timberline, with its magnificent panorama of Mt. Jefferson, Three Finger Jack and lesser peaks, was under the military during the war, but the plan now is to keep it accessible to the general public all the year around.

The Salem area still has its own fine winter (and summer) playground in the picturesque Silver Creek country. And the rugged hills of the North Santiam, with its fine lakes and lodges, would be the mecca for millions were it in less scenic climes. But pending better facilities in the former district and completion of the new road in the Detroit dam area connecting with the latter, there's no harm whatever in boosting Oregon's own Mt. Hood to the fullest, too.

No Longer Treasonous

Winston Churchill's address at Zurich, if it can be regarded as reflecting a growing attitude in Great Britain, shows just how far that country has come toward recognizing the necessity for a new alignment of nations.

Twenty years ago, with Britain regarding France as an all-important bulwark between the Isles and central Europe, the speech would have been viewed as little short of treasonous. Now, however, Churchill will find plenty of support for his suggestion that France and Germany form a partnership as the first step in creating a United States of Europe. Such a partnership in time, and particularly should UN fail in its purpose, would place Britain at the mercy of exactly what she long has opposed—a strong coalition in western Europe a score of miles from her own shores. But with new military missiles which have no regard for distances there is hardly less security in only 20 miles than in 200 or even 2000.

Outside the UN, which still carries the world's hopes and prayers, Britain no longer regards it as necessary to have a buffer between herself and Germany. Or at least, she doesn't regard it as nearly so important as having a particularly strong buffer between herself and Russia. The once-great empire's struggle for secure existence would be more interesting than tragic were it not so starkly desperate in the light of the general world situation in which we, too, find ourselves.

McCourt in Multnomah

The Multnomah county republican executive committee has recommended nomination of John B. McCourt for the office of district attorney, to take the place of the late Thomas B. Handley, who was nominated in May. Governor Snell has taken the recommendation of the committee and appointed McCourt to the position, left vacant by Handley's death.

This is an excellent selection. Son of a former associate justice of the supreme court, graduate of the University of Oregon and of Willamette law school, practicing attorney for many years, member of the legislature for several sessions, member of the regional war labor board and later of the wage stabilization board, McCourt has a fine record of responsible professional and political service.

Assuming the county committee ratifies the selection of its executive committee and makes McCourt the nominee for the regular term Multnomah county voters should have no trouble in deciding between him and his opponent, Tom Mahoney. McCourt's election would insure the county of a clean, honest administration of the district attorney's office.

of Edwin Pauley for undersecretary of the navy. Thus he has driven out the last two of the Roosevelt cabinet and the two who held the closest link with the left wing.

Truman's offhand remark down in Tennessee last year that we would keep the secret of the atomic bomb was another blunder with ill effect round the world.

As for Wallace his course at least has been an honorable one. I do not believe he was actuated by motives of personal political ambition. He has been a pretty good soldier after his rebuff by the democratic convention in 1944. He stood loyal to Roosevelt who failed to support him as in 1940, and loyal to Truman who displaced him as vice president. I think his address was ill-timed, that his policy of appeasement of Russia is wrong; but I give him credit for sincere devotion to the cause of world peace.

What he does now to put together the broken vessel of American prestige? Truman himself lends no confidence at home or abroad. Why not tell him to resign and let Jimmy Byrnes become president?

By Lichty Salem Man on 'Mercy Team' In Atom Work

The application of atomic research to medical treatment and its use in the fight for the life of a 3-year-old Boston girl holds special interest for Salem residents who have learned that a Salem man, John Laughlin, son of Dr. and Mrs. S. B. Laughlin, was one of the scientists who helped prepare radioactive phosphorus for the first treatments.

Laughlin, a graduate of Williamette university, is an assistant professor of physics at the University of Illinois and was one of the "mercy team" of research workers who labored some 24 hours in production of the radioactive chemical, first the U. of I. had been asked to prepare to save a human life.

Scientists do not expect to know until late next month just how successful the experiment has been. However, the medical profession held no hope for the life of Janice Moschella before an injection of a solution of the radioactive phosphorus. She is suffering from a malignant infection of the liver.

The University of Illinois was called upon to manufacture the rare substance after Boston physicians had failed in their appeal to have some of the material processed in the army's Oak Ridge, Tenn., atomic energy oven, it was said. Cyclotrons, the laboratory machines used in the process, at nearby eastern schools were either dismantled or out of order.
