

Christian Education Week to Be Marked by Missionaries, Rally Days in Salem Churches

The week of September 29-October 6 is set aside by the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America as Christian Education Week throughout the nation. Protestant churches give special emphasis to the inauguration, development, and promotion of Christian education for the coming year during this week.

Many of the churches of Salem have made plans for the use of motion pictures, slides, and film strips in church school and young people's programs during the coming year. This program will be in line with the Federal Council's suggestions in the use of vis-

ual aids in the 1946-47 program, emphasizing Biblical, social, educational and religious ideas. Rally day is being observed by most Salem churches either September 29, or on World-wide Communion Sunday, October 6. Rally day officially launches the new program for the year in many of the church schools of the city.

Vet Counsel Aides Needed

Need for additional trained veterans' service officers to handle claims and other problems facing Oregon's increasing load of ex-servicemen was expressed Friday at the regular quarterly meeting of the advisory committee of the state department of veterans' affairs, held in the department offices.

The advisory committee officially approved the efforts of Director George E. Sandy to seek an increase in the ceilings placed by congress on incomes permitted veterans in job training under the GI bill to \$250 and \$300, to concur with recommendations of the Oregon state apprenticeship council.

Announcements were made of the resignation of Secretary Frank Holbrook of Medford, and of Floyd K. Dover, Portland. Dover resigned to become field representative of the department. Appointments will be made to fill these vacancies later by Gov. Earl Snell. Carl Freilinger, Portland member, was elected to fill Holbrook's position of secretary to the committee.

Work Schedule At Silverton Churches Full

Corn Futures Drop 2 Cents

CHICAGO, Sept. 27.—(AP)—Corn led a downturn of grain futures today, falling as much as 2 cents on favorable crop weather, lower prices for grain in the spot market and action of President Truman in ruling against removal of price ceilings from cattle and hogs.

Wheat showed an easier trend throughout the session, closing at about the day's lows. Wheat finished 1-1/4% lower, January \$2.01, corn was off 1 to 2 cents, January \$1.39 1/4-1.40, and oats were unchanged to 1/4% lower, November 80 1/4-1/4.

Profit-taking following the recent upturn was the major factor in wheat, where the market is still thin and highly responsive to a small number of orders, traders noted that the CCC has bought very little grain this week, apparently believing that current prices are too high. In the spot market, No. 2 red wheat sold at \$2.10 1/2 a bushel, up 1/4 from yesterday and another new high on this advance.

Stocks Slow, Decline Noted

NEW YORK, Sept. 27.—(AP)—The recovery sap ran out of a tired looking stock market today and leaders, with scattered exceptions, backed into losing territory. Dealings were the slowest of the month.

Declines running to 2 points or so predominated the close. Transfers of 970,000 shares compared with 1,300,000 Thursday. Brokerage quarters said that three successive advancing sessions attracted quick profit cashing by in-and-out traders while accounts were trimmed elsewhere by those who were skeptical of the labor outlook, price controls and the ability of the list to negotiate other than technical comebacks.

Diplomats Strive To Meet Deadline

PARIS, Sept. 27.—(AP)—The European peace conference completed all but 10 clauses of the Italian peace treaty today as it drove hard for adjournment by the October 15 deadline.

The 10 clauses, however, included three of a political nature on the big problem of Trieste, and there were indications that this issue might have to be shelved indefinitely. The other seven are economic clauses upon which agreement must be reached before the treaty can be sent to the plenary session for final approval.
