

Gaels Rally, Top Washington, 24-20

SEATTLE, Sept. 28 (AP)—The Flying Gaels from St. Mary's made it a happy "revenge" homecoming for their coach, Jimmy Phelan today as they looped in two touchdown passes in five minutes of the last quarter to edge out a spectacular 24 to 20 victory over the school that fired Phelan in 1941—the University of Washington.

Trailing, 20 to 12 as they headed into the final period, the Gaels' smart field general, little 160-pound Denny O'Connor, took over the offensive lead from all-American Halfback Herman Wedemeyer and passed for one touchdown and caught a pass for the winning score.

While the Huskies were laying for the ever-dangerous Wedemeyer, O'Connor tapped an aerial down the middle to end Hank Van Gieson which was good for 43 yards and a touchdown. Shortly thereafter O'Connor stole a pass from Southpaw Gonzalo Morales, outgrabbing Washington's Larry Hutch on the Husky 5, and scoring again.

St. Mary's missed all four conversion attempts, and consequently the Gaels were in the position much of the game of needing at least two scores to outdistance the Huskies.

Wedemeyer put the Gaels in front in the first quarter with a scintillating 46-yard free-wheeling jaunt around right tackle. The Huskies grabbed a 14-6 halftime lead with two second-quarter touchdowns, and each counted once in the third period before the Meragans took command.
